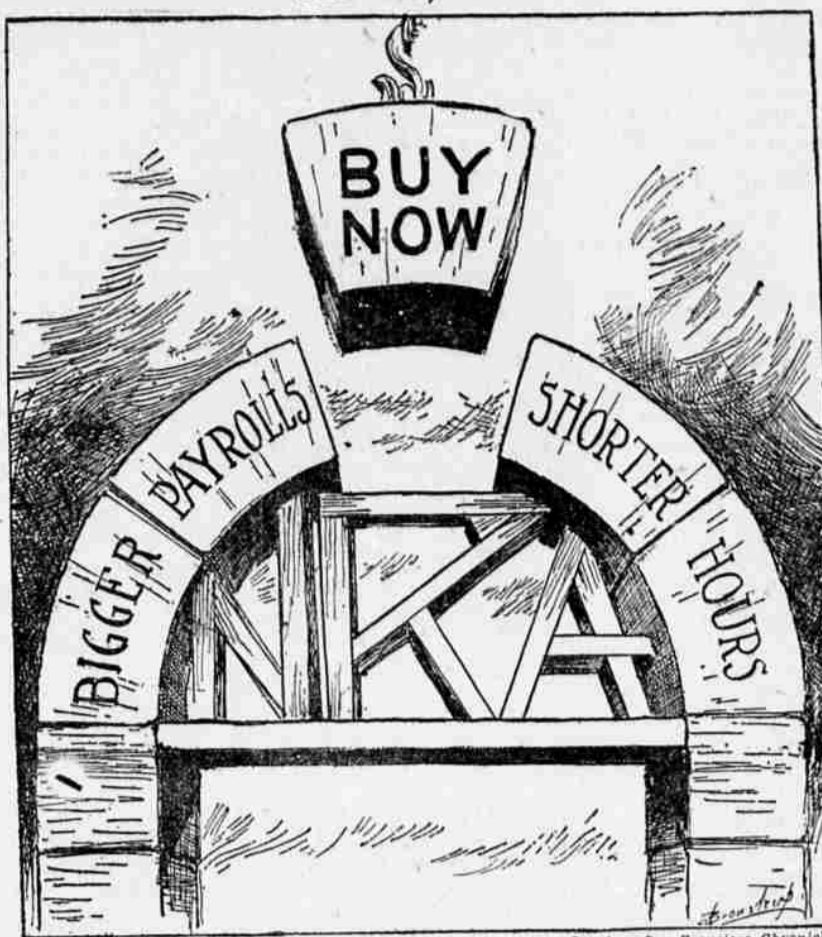

Business Slump At State Prison, That's Good News

SALEM, Nov. 3.—(AP)—"Healthy increases" in business are good news to many and a "healthy decrease" in population is good news to Oregon penitentiary officials.

For the first time in almost four years the population of the Oregon prison is below 800. There are now 797 "enrolled." On December 5, 1929, there were only 794 prisoners. A rapid increase brought the population to the high total of 857 on March 16, 1931.
