Beside his daughter, he leaves one brother and one sister, Marlon O'Harra of Weston, Oregon and Mrs. Ridenour of Chelan, Wash. Also one grand daughter, Helen Bowers Condit and one great-granddaughter, Colleen Condit of Grants Pass.

Funeral services will be conducted by Rev. L. F. Belknap at the Conger chapel at 2:00 p. m. Wednesday. Interment will be in the family plot in Medford I. O. O. F. cemetery.
