

CHEST SUPPORT OF CHARACTER AGENTS URGED BY WILCOX

Attention of going over the top this year in the local community chest drive is emphasized in a letter received yesterday by Hamilton Patton from R. B. Wilcox, chairman of the state relief committee, which pictures clearly the needs confronting every community in social welfare.

"I am sorry that it has been impossible to provide you with a speaker at the opening rally of your community chest drive Friday night, but I am keenly interested in the success of your drive and feel that it may be in order for me to give you my views on the necessity for filling the chest.

"As you well know, government funds, or state funds, were provided and mingled with federal funds, but this is not the case now.

"There are definite federal regulations which limit the uses of federal funds. No provision is made for support of the aged, or children requiring institutional care.

"The recipient of relief must humiliate himself to the extent that he makes application to a public agency, or his case must be brought to its attention by someone else.
