SALES TAX IS BOON TO PROPERTY OWNER BIGHAM CAN TESTIFY

What the sales tax means for the small property owner in California has been brought home to one well-known Medford resident, who happens to own property in Stockton, Cal.

This man is P. C. Bigham, who was showing his tax receipts to friends today. Thanks to the revenue from the sales tax, the tax on Bigham's small holding this year is \$6.07, whereas the average for the three years previous was \$11. In 1931 the tax was \$10.97. This is a tax reduction of over 40 per cent.

According to the general report, this is a typical example for California and the small property owner. A few days ago a resident of San Bernardino visited Medford and also showed friends his tax receipts for this year on his home—there had been a reduction of 42 per cent.

Small wonder, declare believers in this form of taxation, that the taxpayers of that state are enthusiastic over the sales tax. It is relieving the tax burden, and only taxing people in proportion to their expenditure, as well as taxing many people of means who by not owning property have hitherto paid no taxes at all.
