

WHO WILL FILL JACKSON COUNTY SOLON VACANCIES

With the special session of the legislature a week away, Jackson county is still without representation in the lower house, due to Representative E. C. Kelly accepting a federal job in Washington, D. C., and Representative Earl B. Day, now being county judge. Mild interest therefore again prevails as to who will fill the vacancies, and how they will be appointed—by the governor, or the county court.

Governor Meier has shown an inclination to let the appointments rest with the county court. The county court of this county feels that the selections should be made by the executive, to forestall any further possible political schism in Jackson county. Citizens with their finger on the public pulse feel that no matter who the county court named it would be wrong, to some extent, to cover the filling of a legislative vacancy, it generally being done by the governor, on a joint resolution of the legislature. In some Oregon counties where vacancies exist, the county court desires to name their own solons. It is expected that as far as Jackson county is concerned, a resolution will be introduced, giving the power to the governor, and another resolution will be presented giving counties who desire otherwise, the right to name their own legislators.

Glenn O. Taylor, former Medford justice of the peace, is the latest possibility "mentioned." He is a Republican. Despite his firm refusal an effort is being made to have T. E. Daniels of this city accept.

Others "mentioned" at one time or another, are: Fred Colvig, Carl Y. Tengwald, L. M. Sweet of Beagle, Henry Conger of Jacksonville, J. C. Barnes, father of a sales tax, Attorney Porter J. Neff and Attorney William McAllister.

COUNTY SCHOOL POPULATION HAS SLIGHT GROWTH

The school population of Jackson county is 10,102, an increase of 94 over last year, according to figures compiled by the county school superintendent's office. Last year the census showed 9,908 students between the ages of six and 20 years.

Outside of Medford, there are 6,563 students—3,431 boys, and 3,132 girls. Duplications in registrations, may reduce this year's total. All of the school districts except Wagner Creek have filed their census.

The state law provides that a dime be levied for each child of school age.

Ashland has a total school population of 1,324—670 boys, and 654 girls; Jacksonville, 152 boys, and 151 girls, a total of 303; Central Point, 375, with 192 boys, and 183 girls; Gold Hill, 143 boys, and 164 girls, a total of 307; Eagle Point, a total of 117, with 61 boys and 56 girls; Butte Falls, 74 boys, 58 girls, a total of 132; Phoenix, a total of 330, with 165 boys, and 165 girls; Talent, 245, with 122 boys and 123 girls; Rogue River, 281, with 146 boys and 135 girls, and Prospect, 65 boys, and 52 girls.

In the Medford census, the figures have not been computed yet as to boys and girls.
