TELEPHONE PAYS REGULAR DIVIDEND

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—(AP)—The regular quarterly dividend of \$2.25 a share on the capital stock of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. was ordered by the directors today. The dividend disbursement totals around \$42,000,000, but of this amount about \$2,000,000 will be deducted by the company for payment to the government as the tax on corporation dividends. This tax, which will be automatically rescinded with formal repeal of the prohibition amendment on Dec. 5, is collected from individual stockholders, corporation-owned shareholders being exempt because of their general tax liabilities.

The dividend is payable Jan. 15 to stock of record Dec. 15.
