ATTACK ON NRA WINS BOOS FOR SENATOR SCHALL

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 15—(Sp.)—Senator Thomas D. Schall was booted by a University of Minnesota audience today as he gave an address attacking the national recovery program.

The Republican senator from Minnesota, a bitter critic of NRA, first was booted when he referred to President Franklin D. Roosevelt as "Frankenstein Roosevelt" in talking about war debts which he said the President was cancelling.

Another outburst came when he said Lincoln and Washington would "turn over in their graves" at NRA activities, which he asserted were being pushed "with the government controlling the newspaper, radio and movies."

He then said, "I know it's hard, boys, but you've got to hear the truth."

Thereafter he was not interrupted. "We could have raised tariff barriers and have had every man back at work within a few months, but as long as the NRA continues to last, everything is going to remain backward," he said, and termed the recovery measure "the national ruin act."

He addressed 1,100 students and faculty members.
