

# Pigskin Prophets Face Difficult Problems in Saturday Main Events

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Another banner array of big-time games, complicated by tradition and all the uncertainties that traditional rivalries bring, presents the puzzled football fan some nice problems this week.

On the basis of what has occurred so far, the prospects for the major clashes line up something like this: Fordham-Oregon State — A slight leaning toward Fordham can be explained by the Rams' apparent superiority on the attack.

Southern California-Oregon—There is no tougher one on the list. The weak offense the Trojans have shown so far gives the northwest outfit an all but invisible edge.

Michigan-Minnesota — The crucial hurdle for Michigan's undefeated and untied Wolverines, who rate a national edge on the rested Gophers.

Pitt-Nebraska—Their own national aspirations ruined, the Pitt Panthers hope to wreck Nebraska's perfect record and look slightly stronger in this clash of evenly matched eleven.

Georgia-Auburn—Most football observers are content to string along with Georgia's undefeated Bulldogs.

Princeton-Navy — Princeton's unbeaten Tigers rule pronounced favorites, and deservedly so.

Purdue-Iowa — The Boiler-makers should win, but Iowa undoubtedly will put up a strenuous argument.

Duke-North Carolina—The records point to another triumph for unbeaten Duke.

Louisiana State-Mississippi—Louisiana State should keep in the southern conference race in this one.

Tennessee-Vanderbilt — Tennessee seems to have the stuff to eliminate Vanderbilt from the same race.

Penn-Penn State—Penn the indicated winner.

Army-Penn Military — Army's reserves should take care of the cadets from Chester, Pa.

Georgetown-Carnegie Tech—Carnegie justly favored.

Kansas State-Oklahoma — Another top-up duel with Kansas State perhaps a little stronger.

Kansas-Iowa State—It's doubtful whether Iowa State can pierce the Kansas defense and a tie seems possible.

Boston College-Western Maryland—Another tight struggle indicated with Boston College a slight favorite.

Stanford-Montana—Stanford.

Oklahoma A. and M.—Creighton—A. and M. apparently much too strong for Creighton.

**Vets' Bureau to Pay**  
Under present plans, there will be no general allocation of funds for this work. As money for payrolls and material is needed, vouchers signed by state civil works administration heads will be paid by the United States veterans' bureau, which will be the disbursing agency.

Advices from Washington, D. C., quoted Harry Hopkins, federal emergency relief administrator, as having declared: "Don't talk dollars. Provide jobs, and the wages will be forthcoming."

Most of the work will be done by hand labor, it is believed. Wages will be 20 cents an hour for common, and \$1.20 an hour for skilled labor.

Regular jobs will be provided first to men now on relief, and then to men registered in employment bureaus. No civil works jobs will be given unless the men are taken off relief.

**Mostly Road Work**  
C. C. Hockley, state engineer for the public works administration, said he believes most of the work will be on highways, but that any job where hand labor is applicable probably will come under the provisions of the government's order.

Such projects would not include sewage disposal plants, he believes, or water and power developments which would require extensive engineering and construction.

The state highway commission, Hockley said he has been advised, is awaiting instructions before starting on a program under the latest developments of the public works administration.
