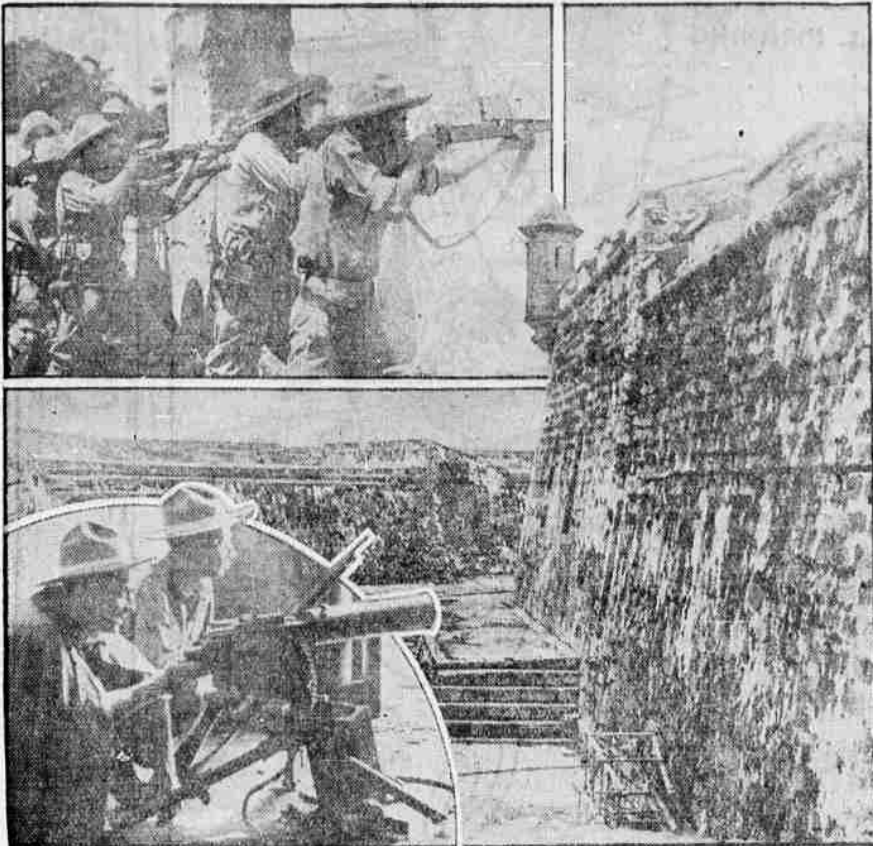


LATEST SCENE OF WARFARE IN CUBAN REVOLT

TOUHY GANGSTERS ON TRIAL IN HAMM KIDNAPING



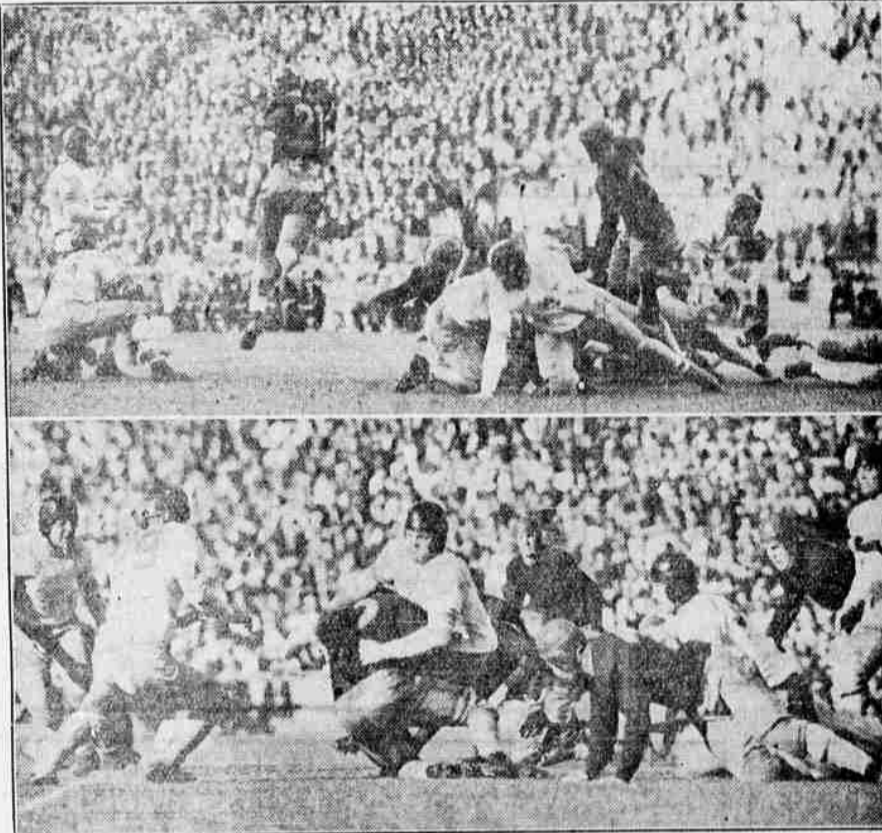

May Help Refugees



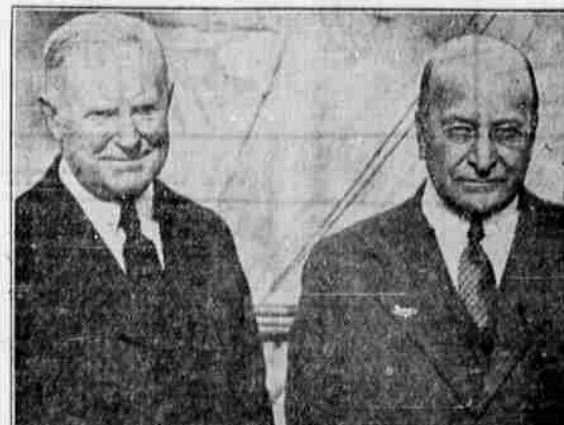
