

WHO SHALL PLAY ROSE BOWL TILT TOUGH QUESTION

Far Western Situation Badly Jumbled—Two In East, One From South Candidates For New Years.

PASADENA, Calif., Nov. 20.—(AP)—Two eastern teams and one from the south stood out today as the leading candidates for the invitation to the annual New Year's day Rose Tournament football game today.

At the same time, the far western setup was in a bad jumble with prospect that it might be even more jumbled up in another week.

Army and Princeton of the Atlantic seaboard and Duke in the south, remained as the eligible undefeated eleven, while Stanford, should it be able to successfully cope with California Saturday, was favored to carry the Pacific coast's banner.

Matter complicated But there were underlying conditions which figured to complicate matters. The west would like to have invited Army last season but was given to understand the offer could not be accepted.

While the Webfoots are not entirely out of the picture, because they can get no less than a tie for the Pacific coast conference title, the 26 to 0 defeat Saturday was too convincing to be overlooked.

In case of a Stanford defeat, Southern California would pop back into the picture, although Troy trods a troublesome road with Notre Dame, Georgia and Washington still on the schedule.

California. If it beats Stanford would step back into the running, and Oregon State could not be completely counted out after its sensational victory over Fordham Saturday.

The eastern selection, of course, would depend much on the team picked in the west, as the host institution has sole power in the matter of issuing an invitation.

KICKOFF RETURN FRANKLIN'S HABIT

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 20.—(AP)—Norman "Red" Franklin, star Oregon State halfback, and Oregon's strongest bid for an all-American rating, makes a habit of returning kickoffs, as he did on his 93-yard dash against the Fordham Rams Saturday, a search of records has revealed.

The return in the Fordham clash was the fourth counted by Franklin in his collegiate career. The first two came in a game against the Oregon frosh, when he was a freshman, both for more than 90 yards, and his third at the expense of San Francisco university earlier this season, when he sped through the Dons for 93 yards and a touchdown.

PUGET COLLEGE RETAINS TITLE

SEATTLE, Nov. 20.—(AP)—College of Puget Sound won the northwest conference grid race for the second consecutive season by handing Pacific University a 13-0 beating at Forest Grove, Ore., Saturday. The Loggers finished their schedule with five conference wins and no defeats or ties, winning over Albany, Willamette, Whitman, College of Idaho and Pacific in that order.

Whitman and College of Idaho battle to a 7-7 draw at Caldwell, Idaho, for the first conference tie game of the season.

In a third conference game for the week-end, Willamette trounced Albany 26-6 Friday night.

A single contest remains on the schedule, Willamette meeting Whitman at Walla Walla, November 30.
