

### RANKIN SHOWERED WITH TOKENS AT FAREWELL PARTY

Honoring Hugh B. Rankin, who retires the last of this month as supervisor of the Rogue River national forest, after 26 years in the forestry work, employees of the forest and their friends Sunday entertained with a large party at Rogue Elk, 125 being in attendance.

Supervisor Rankin was presented a number of gifts, each of the five RCW camps in the forest presenting him with a token, as well as the regular forest personnel, including the forest guards and road foremen.

Moon Prairie camp, M. A. Murdock, superintendent, gave Mr. Rankin a chair of yew wood, which the boys at the camp had made. The Lake of the Woods camp, of which R. M. Smith is superintendent, presented a bench of lodgepole pine, and the Upper Rogue River camp, C. G. Hoover, superintendent, gave an occasional table of polished petrified wood slabs in a black walnut frame.

A roasting chest and footstool were presented from the Elk Creek camp, of which J. P. DeWitt is superintendent. From Applegate camp came a hall-tree of yew wood with a laurel base. H. L. Nutting is superintendent of this group.

During the afternoon, speeches were made by E. J. Hankin, of Fortland, who is with the forestry office there; Karl L. Janouch, who will succeed Mr. Rankin as supervisor, and J. E. Griddle, who has been stationed in the Lake of the Woods section during the summer.

The presentation from the camps was made by the various camp superintendents.

Program for the afternoon was in charge of the girls from the forestry office, with Miss Janie Smith as chairman. Music for the afternoon was furnished by J. W. Lichtenberger and daughter and Mrs. J. W. Sullivan.

Their home and all its contents destroyed by fire yesterday, a widow and her four young children of the Roxy Ann district are today facing a bleak prospect. Members of the Roxy Ann Grange, at their meeting last night, undertook to seek some measure of relief for the unfortunate family and were busy today in efforts to secure needed furniture, bedding, clothing, kitchen utensils, tableware, groceries and money, to enable a new start.

A distressing feature of the fire was the fact that negotiations had been made for trading the country place for a small home in Medford, and the deal was to have been consummated this week. With the loss of the uninsured house, however, the family, whose husband and father died suddenly only six weeks ago, was left without money, shelter, food or clothing.

A number of leading Democrats of the county wired Governor Julia Meier last night urging the appointment of A. Moore Hamilton, president of the Young Democratic league of Jackson county, as successor to E. C. Kelly, in the house of representatives. Kelly's place was made vacant by his having received appointment to a federal post in Washington, D. C.

The telegram, according to Frank DeSouza, local Democratic wheelhorse, points out to the governor that appointment of Hamilton would be in line with the wishes of the people who, at the last election, chose Kelly, a Democrat, to represent them in the legislature.

Hamilton, who has been active in county Democratic circles for some time, is a son of C. T. Hamilton, orchardist of the McAndrews Hill district, and is editor of the Medford News.

Method of filling the legislative vacancies for the special session, convened Monday, has not yet been decided, some wishing the governor to name substitute senators, while other counties want it done by county courts.
