VICTORY MEANS UNSULLIED TITLE FOR MEDFORDITES

Lithians Expected to Strive Mightily in Climaxing Clash of Season—Game Called for 2 o'Clock

Championship bound, the Medford high school Tigers will meet the strong Ashland high school Grizzlies tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock on the Ashland Junior high school field.

Medford and Ashland fans are assured a very exciting time. From the first foot of the whistle until the last thump of the pigskin, there will be plenty doing. From this clash will come a basis of comparison in figuring the championship hopes of Medford.

At present Medford is the only team in the state undefeated and untied and the game tomorrow will give Medford an undisputed rating in comparison to other prep teams of the state.

Ashland Could Tie Rating.

The best that Ashland can get is a tie for Southern Oregon honors.

According to reports, Don Faber, Ashland coach, has no decided definitely what type of armament he will use. He may use the aerial route and he may use the infantry forces, but in all probability he will have some home cooked tricks worked up to pull on the Bengals. Ashland has always been known as a deceptive grid machine, no one person, except the coach, knowing what is going to be pulled until the kickoff.

Has Speedy Backfield.

Ashland is made up of a light, speedy backfield which last year proved very troublesome at times, and a line that is heavy in spots but averages around 170 pounds. The backfield is led by a little speedster by the name of Durham. Durham has been touted as a triple threat artist. He is particularly noted for his quarterback sneaks through the line. The line is led by a 247-pound "Primo Carnera," who has been Ashland's main cog on defense, as well as offense. It is through his side of the line that this quarterback sneak is pulled.

Crucial Game.

Medford has been bowling over all opposition and is pointing for the state championship for the second consecutive year. The game tomorrow means everything to the Medford team, if they win it will give them the undisputed right to the state and southern Oregon championship. It means that if Medford wins and any other team in the state disputes the right of Medford to the throne, they will have an opportunity to settle the dispute on the gridiron Thanksgiving day.

Salem and Bend are the only teams in the state that can possibly challenge Medford on the basis of equality. Salem and Bend have gone through the season with overwhelming records in comparative scores.

Football Wiseacres Find Hard Task in Selecting Next Saturday Winners

NEW YORK, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Still a bit shell-shocked after last week's dazzling array of upsets, football followers, looking for winners, discover another set of traditional battles rising up to confront them tomorrow.

In most instances, there is little to choose between the big game rivals, but on the basis of results to date, the prospects line up something like this:

Army-Navy: This colorful clash, the first regularly scheduled game between the service academies since 1927, finds the Army favored. The Tars are much stronger than a year ago, but the impression is general that the advantage of manpower still lies with the Cadets. With Buzz Borries, Red Baumberger and Bill Clark, Navy has plenty of backfield strength to match Army's Jack Buckler, Paul Johnson and Joe Stanocok, but the West Point line appears stronger. Army will be seeking to protect an undefeated and untied record. Navy has lost to Pitt, Columbia and Princeton while beating Penn and Notre Dame in major games.

Yale-Harvard: Seldom have these ancient rivals come down to their annual battle more closely matched, on paper at least. But here again there is a well-defined leaning toward Yale, perhaps largely because of the Elis' fine showing against George and the fact that the Blue had had the benefit of two weeks of comparative rest. Harvard won its first major victory last week, but there was little to cheer about in the Crimson's 12-6 triumph over Brown. Yale's record in major games shows victories over Brown and Dartmouth, defeats by Army and Georgia. Harvard has been beaten by Holy Cross and Army and tied by Dartmouth.

Notre Dame-Southern California: The renewal of this classic finds both teams already beaten and the edge in Southern California's favor. Tied by Oregon State and beaten by Stanford, the Trojans came back with a bang last week to wallop Oregon, 26-0. Notre Dame's first touchdown in five games beat Northwestern last week, but the Ramblers are doing most of their ground-gaining between the 20-yard line.

Michigan-Northwestern: Michigan is the choice to hurdle the last obstacle in the Wolverines' path to the Big Ten title.

Princeton-Rutgers: Rutgers has a fast, clever team but the Scarlet ap-

RAMBLING ROBOTS OF OREGON STATE COLORFUL OUTFIT

Eleven-Man Battle With Trojans—Point Conversion Defense—Franklin's Runs With Kick All Astonish

PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—(UP)—The rambling robots of Oregon State are the football localities of the country as well as the "color team" of the 1933 season.

A year ago who would have suspected:

1. Southern California being held to a scoreless tie—by 11 Oregon State men only.
2. A defense against conversion points by holding a six-foot six-inch center into the onse to bat down the kick.
3. A halfback who twice in the same season ran back the opening kickoff 95 yards to a touchdown.
4. A tackle with two weeks' experience at placement kicking, propelling perfect kicks between the uprights in successive games against Oregon and Pomona—one for a total distance of 28 yards, the other for 43.
5. A Beaver team which wound up far from being the conference doormat—and went to town in its first season under a coach who draws one of the lowest pay-checks in the Coast circuit.

Win, lose or draw in their last game of the season with Nebraska Thanksgiving day, the robots have made this their most successful campaign in years, and O. S. C. finances are beginning to see the light of day as a result.

They have proved you don't have to match substitutions to withhold U. S. C. They handed Troy its first goose-egg since 1930, and stand as the only team to keep U. S. C. from scoring this fall.

A rangy team, they played football in a big, rangy manner, a la Paul Bunyan. Surely, that long place kick of Ray Schwamm's, last Saturday, smacked of the northwest's legendary hero's feats. And those long runs into the air by lanky Clyde Devine, as a defense against points after touchdown.

And that blow at the Bunyans of gridiron finance, who saw Lon Stinger, a first-year coach drawing under \$5,000, make it tough for the money men from one end of the country to the other.

Yes, the rambling robots are the color team of the year. And if this season continues to provide upsets Saturday after Saturday, with Stanford and U. S. C. taking additional bumps before they complete their schedule, how about nominating Oregon State's mighty iron men for consideration in that Rose Bowl classic?

Stanford-California: The far west's "natural" of the day with Stanford slightly favored to win, the Oregon for the Coast conference title and perhaps receive the Rose Bowl assignment.

Duke-North Carolina State: Duke's perfect record seems safe for at least another week.

Georgia Tech-New York University: The Tartans from Pittsburgh seem stronger.

Ohio State-Illinois: Probably one of the closest battles of the afternoon, with a slight leaning toward Ohio State.

Washington State-Washington: Another loss, with a tie apparently as good a guess as any.

Columbia-Syracuse: This looks like a winning finale for Columbia.

Indiana-Purdue: Purdue the indicated winner.

Lehigh-Lafayette: A renewal of one of the oldest of all football battles, with Lafayette favored.

U. C. L. A.-St. Mary's: A hailout for St. Mary's, but by no lopsided count.

Southern Methodist-Baylor: Perhaps Baylor will pull another one out of the fire.

Texas Christian-Rice: Maybe the Horned Frogs have really started rolling now. If so, Rice appears in for a bad afternoon.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24.—(AP)—Overhadowing far western football events more commanding than ever in recent years, the annual "big game" between Stanford University and the University of California will monopolize gridiron interest of the Pacific coast tomorrow.

Up at Pullman, Wash., the Pacific northwest will play a big game of its own—the classic between the University of Washington and Washington State college.

Down at Los Angeles, the Bruins of the University of California at Los Angeles and the Gaels of St. Mary's college will meet in Memorial Coliseum, while University of Southern California's Trojans are back at South Bend, Ind., tussling with the Notre Dame Fighting Irish.

But Stanford's big brown bull, jammed with an expected capacity crowd of 90,000, will be the focal point, as Bear and Cardinal meet in a contest magnified to outstanding proportions this year by more than traditional rivalry.

Almost certainly for Stanford and possibly for California a win will mean a bid to represent the west in the Rose Bowl. For Stanford a victory will mean a tie with the University of Oregon for the Pacific Coast conference championship, and for either team a win will bring possession of the coveted Stanford axe, symbol of the old-time rivalry.

Few recent Stanford-California football games have had such a background of conflict and "dope" to puzzle the experts.

Because of their great showing against the Trojans and their speedy array of backfield material, the Cards are 10 to 8 favorites over the more experienced California team.

In their contest with Washington, the Washington State Cougars will have the advantage of one of the most persistent jinxes in western football. Never during the regime of Coach Orin Hollinsberry have the Cougars been defeated in a conference
