

THANKSGIVING DAY FEAST WILL COST NEAR 1932 FIGURE

Reduced Price of Turkey Is Offset by Higher Outlay for Fixings — Liquid Portion Now at Lower Mark

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NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—(UP)—The Thanksgiving dinner this year will cost the average householder just about the same as last year, a reduced price for the turkey being offset by higher prices for the "fixings."

Turkey prices, according to retail reports from major cities, have dropped to the lowest levels in years and one company—the great Atlantic & Pacific Tea company—reported the price quoted this year was the lowest in the history of the company.

Turks Reasonable.
In New York City, northwest turkeys are quoted at 23 cents a pound as against 29 cents a pound by the majority of the chain stores. The prices go higher in some of the independent shops. Chicago shows the same change, while in Kansas City the price this year ranges from 19 to 25 cents a pound as against 18 to 25 cents a pound last year.

Kansas City estimates that a Thanksgiving dinner this year can be served at \$3.50 while last year the cost was \$4.50—excluding labor, fuel and wines, whether the family decides to cheat a week on repeal. In New York City the cost for a family of four will be around \$5, figuring on the basis of a 10-pound turkey, approximately the same cost as last year.

Cranberries Higher.
Cranberries, one of the important items, are higher. In New York City the price has jumped half a cent a pound to 10 cents. In Chicago the price was jumped one cent a pound to 8½ cents. Kansas City estimates two pumpkin pies can be made at home for 20 cents.

Spices are unchanged.
Bread has advanced in price, increasing the cost of the dressing, while lettuce and celery show fairish advances in New York and are unchanged in Chicago. In the latter instance, however, celery one gets for five cents per bunch comes in a smaller bunch.

Butter has increased noticeably, while potatoes have advanced. Sweet potatoes in most cities are slightly under the price quoted last year. Milk and cream had advanced generally, the latter sharply in the eastern district.

Nuts, olives and candies all are higher this year than last year.
Drinks Come Cheap.
For those desiring to sneak up on repeal and embellish their meal with wines and cordials, the price has dropped sharply in New York City. Last year the price of whiskies—for the cocktails—were on an ascending market. This year whiskies are at the minimum for prohibition, with plenty on hand.

Domestic wine shops clog the sidewalks of New York and the prices are reasonable. The best grades of ports and sherries from the California vineyards are about \$1.50 a quart, Chablis is \$1.25 a quart and sauternes is \$1 a quart. Straight burgundy is \$1 a quart with the price for the sparkling variety around \$3. Those desiring imported wines will find the prices materially reduced. The "real" champagnes are around \$5 to \$6 a quart as against \$7 and \$8 a quart last year, depending on the vintage. Sauternes is about \$4 a quart. Chablis is about the same. Ports and sherries, bearing famous labels, run around \$5 a quart. The supply is plentiful.

ASHLAND SPEEDS PLACING OF MEN IN CWA PROGRAM

ASHLAND, Nov. 28.—(Sp.)—The Civil Works program through which 140 Ashland men will be given work for the next three months, got under way Monday morning, with work on three jobs started.

Eleven men were at work tearing down the dome of the Chautauqua building; three men were put to work cleaning the city cemetery, and a crew of five men started at work on the cleaning of Reeder dam. Work on the Dead Indian road started Friday, with 29 men employed.

All of the men are those who have been receiving county aid. The three Ashland projects are employing Ashland residents, while residents to the south of the city were given jobs on the Dead Indian road.

Additional men, until Ashland's quota of 140 men is filled, will be put to work on various projects as soon as they receive official approval. More men will be assigned to work on the Reeder dam project as soon as an amended report on the number of men needed is approved.

AMERICAN WOMEN ARE BEST COOKS SAYS NOTED CHEF

Thanksgiving Feast Should Be Typically American — Gives Model Holiday Menu Simple and Enticing

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—(UP)—Millions of American housewives this week will ask themselves the question: "What shall I have for Thanksgiving dinner?"

The answer, stoutly advocated by Jacob Kohler, internationally famous chef, is: "American foods, cooked in American style and served in the American way."

Any American housewife who offers her family anything except the native cuisine on the day devoted to Thanksgiving for the good things produced by America is "guilty," says Kohler, of "no patriotism, no sense of the appropriate and—worst of all—no appreciation of the best style of preparing foods that the world has found."

U. S. Women Best Cooks.
"There is," proclaimed the chef, as he dashed about the steaming kitchen of the large Michigan boulevard restaurant over which he presides, "no better cooking in the world than the American woman has developed."

"A Parisian chef may capture certain palates with his sauces and dressings, but the apex of cooking is reached when the cook learns to achieve the same result by developing natural flavors."

Deriding the contention that any question of "culture" or superior taste is involved in a dispute over the eating habits of two races, Kohler declared that ham and eggs, or steak and potatoes are the appropriate staples of a race prodigal of energy and active in sports.

French Cooking, Bah!
"Let the French have French cooking and French foods," said Kohler, "but for me, let me have a broiled tenderloin in its own juices."

Elaborating his statement that native food products should have first place on Thanksgiving day tables, Kohler pointed to a model holiday menu hanging in his kitchen. It started the meal with a fruit cocktail and included a simple salad; roast turkey, with sage dressing, cranberry sauce, succotash prepared with green lima beans, corn and peas, warm light rolls and coffee.

"And," said Kohler, "if you must serve a drink, make it a highball before dinner. That's American, and there's no reason to be ashamed of it. If a highball is what you like, then sauterne and moelle are inferior products."
