

LIQUOR CONTROL BILL READY FOR DEBATE FRIDAY

owners desire in the composite truck bill which is being drawn. The committee themselves proposed changes in the present transportation law. The alcoholic committee today was adding to the Knox liquor bill, one of the amendments being limiting liquor advertising to brands and quality rather than price.

Changes already made in the truck and bus bill include:

Eliminate all insurance requirements and return unearned deposits now on hand.

Exclude all trucks not exceeding one-half ton load capacity from the state transportation act and place them under a \$5 license fee.

License trailers with load capacity exceeding one-half ton.

Drop Bond Requirements. Strike out all bond requirements.

Exclude ambulances, armored cars and hearses from provisions of the act.

No definite word of the committee's stand on mileage and license fee provisions of the present law was yet determined.

The Truck Owners' and Farmers' Protective association in particular has repeatedly spoken for striking out the mileage fees also and substituting a monthly fee based on tonnage.

Its announced legislative program also omits insurance requirements unless they are applied to all motor vehicles.

County clerks, sheriffs and treasurers would be required to make annual instead of semi-annual reports under provisions of a bill by Senator Wheeler, introduced today.

A flat license fee of \$12.50 per year for retail produce peddlers is sought in a bill bearing the names of Senators Brown, Burke and Zimmerman.

Work on repairs to the jail and other buildings damaged by the mob was started and City Manager Claire O. Jwin announced the two trees from which Thurmond and Holmes were hanged would be uprooted and destroyed.

Alex J. Hart, merchant and father of the 22-year-old kidnaping victim, whose body was placed in the family vault yesterday, was among those regretting the mob action. "I am so overcome with my own grief," he said, "that I am unable to think of the other terrible thing. My sympathy goes out to the families of those two men."

Rolph reaffirms stand Governor Rolph reaffirmed his approval of the action "by the aroused people" of San Jose in a statement in San Francisco last night, and then went to Sacramento where, on the second time, he cancelled a proposed trip to Boise, Idaho.

The governor said in a telegram to Governor Ross of Idaho, announcing his change of plans, that "conditions in California are very unsettled" because of the lynchings and he deemed it advisable not to make the trip.

Regarding the many messages of condemnation and praise for his attitude, the governor said that criti-

clam was to be expected. "Those criticizing me," he added, "do not realize what would have happened had the national guard moved in and moved down innocent citizens."
