

Mikulak, Franklin, Schwammel Favored for All Coast Grid Squad

OREGON SCHOOLS WELL RECOGNIZED IN ANNUAL POLL

Officials, Coaches and Sport Writers Near Unanimous for Franklin — Mark Temple On Second Team

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Players from three Pacific Coast conference football squads — Southern California, Stanford and Oregon State — form more than half of the Associated Press' ninth annual all-Pacific coast football team, presented today as the consensus of leading officials, coaches and sports writers. Five other schools are represented by one player each.

Oregon, which tied Stanford for the conference title; California, University of San Francisco, St. Mary's college and Washington placed one gridiron warrior on the first eleven. Representative Poll.

The collective opinion represented the heaviest and most representative balloting in nine years with more than 50 observers in all sections of the west voting.

Oregon State, playing its first year under Coach Lon Stiner, placed the shifty, triple-threat speedster, Norman Franklin, at one of the half-back posts by a near unanimous vote. His teammate, Adolph Schwammel, won one of the tackle berths.

George Wilson of St. Mary's was chosen as Franklin's running mate at the other half-back position.

Mike Mikulak of Oregon got three times as many votes for fullback as did his closest rival.

The west's representative in the annual Rose Bowl game, Stanford, placed its veteran guard, Bill Corbus, and flashy sophomore end, Jim Moscrip, on the first all-coast.

Irvine "Cotton" Warburton, 147 pounds of elusiveness, was placed at quarterback by the observers as was his teammate, Aaron Rosenberg, guard of Southern California. Lawrence Siemerling, ball-hawking center of the University of San Francisco, easily won the center berth.

Lawrence Lutz, fighting sophomore tackle of California, made the first team, as did Bill Smith, a veteran end of Washington's eleven. Corbus and Rosenberg won a place on the all-coast for the second consecutive year.

The Stanford guard and Franklin were the popular choices, each receiving 42 votes while Warburton's tally was 41.

All Schools Represented. Every school in the conference was represented on one of the three teams.

The 1933 selection presents the lightest and fastest backfield chosen in nine years, with an average weight of 173 pounds. The line averages 300 pounds and includes three accurate field goal kickers in Schwammel, Corbus and Smith. Smith made all of the points registered by Washington in two games.

Bill Morgan, who in his high school days was a star football and basketball player for Medford, in the regime of Coach Prink Callison, is now rated as the best tackle in the National Football league. Morgan is playing pro football with the New York Giants.

He completed four years of football at the University of Oregon last year, and was mentioned for all-American, and given all-Coast tackle honors.

According to the New York Post, "Morgan, former University of Oregon 235-pounder, has proven sensational in recent games, and is now rated as the best tackle of the National circuit." The circuit is composed of former college stars.

Morgan expects to return to this city in time for Christmas, and will start a post-graduate course at the University of Oregon at the start of the second term.

Trojans, Ohio State Agree on Two Games

Bend Team to Arrive Wednesday — Kickoff Scheduled for Two o'Clock — Tigers Take Light Practice

Tickets for the Bend-Medford high school football game here Thanksgiving day, with the state mythical title as the prize for the winner, will go on sale tomorrow at "Your Office Boy," "Togery" and the high school booth at the Chamber of Commerce.

The Medford squad came out of the Ashland game with no injuries and will be in fine physical shape. The Bend team, with ten days' rest, will also be at peak form. The squad is due to arrive here by auto stage Wednesday and will stage a light workout on Van Scoyoc field.

Kickoff at 2 P. M. The game will start promptly at 2 o'clock, the time favored by the visitors. The start will be promptly at that hour, as dusk comes early these days. The time will also allow those with early or late Thanksgiving day dinners to see the contest.

The Medford team will go through light practices today and tomorrow, under the direction of Coach Burgher.

A large delegation of rooters from Bend will accompany the team here. The contest, despite the Salem-Washington game on the same date, is attracting statewide interest. Medford stands as the only undefeated and untied squad in the state. Victory over Bend will give it a clear title—as clear as any state title ever gets.

Ben Boasts Giants. The Bend team consists of 27 players and their average weight is 151 pounds. Their main strength lies in Clifford Storm, a 180-pound fullback, and two giant tackles, John Svecic, 235 pounds, and Mike Svecic, 212 pounds. Storm is a three-year player and does most of the work assisted by the Svecic brothers. He is a fast and flashy player.

Bend has scored 205 points to its opponents' 32 points during the past season. It played a 13-13 tie with Salem high.
