

Medford-Bend State Title Clash on Van Scoyoc Field Tomorrow

HIGH SCHOOL GRID CLASSIC KICKOFF SCHEDULED 2 P. M.

Tigers at Top Form to Repulse Invading Lava Bears—Huge Crowd Expected for Turkey Day Feature

Who: Medford vs. Bend.
Where: Van Scoyoc field, 2 p. m.
What: Mythical state championship of Oregon, the first to be played in Medford.
Coaches: Darwin K. Burgher, Medford; M. A. Cochran, Bend.
Captains: Clifford Storm, Bend; Tom White, Medford.
Gates open 1 o'clock.

Final preparations were completed today for the state football game tomorrow afternoon at Van Scoyoc field between the Medford high school, champions of the Southern Oregon district, and Bend, undisputed title holders for the Eastern Oregon section.

The game will start at 2 o'clock sharp. Clear, crisp weather is the forecast today. A large crowd, with football fans from Ashland, Klamath Falls and a delegation of Bend rooters, will see the contest. The winner will have a logical and strong claim to the mythical state title.

Bend Due Today
The Bend team left this morning by auto bus and will arrive here by mid-afternoon after a stop at Klamath Falls at noon for lunch.

The Lava Bears come with their dander up and determined to avenge two past defeats at the hands of Medford. They are somewhat nettled at their shunting aside for Salem in the Shrine benefit at Portland. Bend was rated as the strongest of the two squads by the sport writers. Salem was disregarded because Salem was closest and promised to send a crowd of 2000 to see the game. Both Salem and Washington high have been tied, the latter team three times, during its Portland season. No claim is made that the game will decide anything but the championship of Portland and Salem.

Weights Near Even
Outside of the two tackles, the Burghermesters will be on a par with the Bend team and will have a slight advantage in weight at other spots. The Svetic brothers—235 and 212 pounds—play tackles for the visitors. Against them Medford will have Estes, 170 pounds; Kindred, 169, and Fowler, 170.
Clifford Storm, a 180-pound fullback is the ace of the Bend backfield. He is a spectacular open field runner, and the main threat of the team. Bates, the Tiger fullback, carries 175 pounds.
Bend's two ends weigh but 135 pounds. They will be opposed by Hinman and Bennett, both 160-pounders, and plenty fast.

The Burghermesters will have both speed and weight in the backfield—Lewis, Brown, White and Bates supply the heft—Ghelard and Gillinski the speed.
An effort is under way to have the Oregon-St. Mary's game announced from the field. This game does not start until 1 o'clock. In previous years it has been a morning game.

SALEM FANS GOING IN SPECIAL TRAIN

KETCHEL EASILY

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29.—(AP)—Displaying a hard-hitting attack that sent his opponent to the canvas twice Young Firpo of Burke, Idaho, was awarded the decision over Wesley Ketchell of Portland in the 10-round main event on last night's fight program here. Firpo weighed 174 pounds, and Ketchell, 165.
Ketchell assumed an early lead by knocking Firpo down in the first round, but the Idaho fighter answered with a knockdown in the second round, and in the sixth frame he hit Ketchell a hard blow to the jaw that dropped the Portlander for a count of nine.
Big Ecklund, 167, Portland, was awarded the decision over Pete Sumski, 177, Portland, in the four-round semi-windup.
Roy Oakley, 138, Portland, and Ernie Cavelli, 141, Walla Walla, fought four rounds to a draw.
Frankie Monroe, 137, Klamath Falls, won from Young Harry Wills, 139, Longview, Wash., getting a four-round decision.
Al Spina, 116, Portland, defeated Jackie Kileen, 120, Salem, four-round decision.
Pastor Callopo, 141, Manila Filipino, won a technical knockout over Rollie Westerman, 138, Portland, in the final round of the four-round opener.
