

MOB OVERWHELMS POLICE, SOLDIERS TO SEIZE VICTIM

scene of the assault, a mile away. Girl Victim Hysterical. The girl victim of the attack, waylaid on her way home from a motion picture theater, was reported near hysteria. Battered and bruised by her assailant, she was found in the alley tied with her own stockings. Officers said she was the second woman Warner had attacked. He was accused of assaulting a negro girl six months ago, but there was no prosecution. The offense and defense in the jail warfare, started soon after dusk with the hurling of stones and a vain attempt to break in the front door with a 5-inch pipe as a battering ram. Officers scattered the crowd with tear gas. Governor Guy B. Park ordered out the tank company. Truck Opens Door. The mob obtained a truck and moved it around to the grilling back door. A chain was attached and the truck took the door away. A tank driver who failed to close a door of his vehicle securely was hauled out and interned. The tank went out of action. Sheriff Thelsen drew a revolver as the mob started in. He held the leaders at bay momentarily. They brushed past him as tear gas fogged the corridor. Police and sheriff's deputies battled hard to hand with the crowd, but were pressed back by the heavy odds. Tear gas bombs exploded at intervals. A few wild shots were fired. State highway patrol headquarters appealed to "rush all available peace officers to crush all available men to St. Joseph."

Ald Comes Too Late. The mob had won, however, before reinforcements arrived. The nose was placed on Warner's neck, gasoline obtained from a nearby filling station was hurled upon his trousers and a torch was applied. Later men built a fire beneath the body. The flames burned the rope and the body fell upon the embers. At 1:05 a. m. Fire Chief Leo J. Urbanski drove to the scene and extinguished the fire. The body was taken to an undertaking establishment.

Law Favored Delay. Officers said Warner sought to plead guilty yesterday to the assault charge. Judge J. V. Gaddy, however, directed postponement of the case until today. "I don't want to rush things," he said.

The jail wrecked last night three years ago withstood the assault of a mob seeking Raymond Gunn, a negro accused of the brutal slaying of Velma Colter, a young Maryville, Mo., school teacher. A few days later, however, Gunn was seized by a crowd on his way from jail to court at Maryville. He was taken to the frame school house where Miss Colter was slain, chained to the roof and burned with the building.

DINNER FOR THREE The Menu Escalloped Tuna and Celery Baked Sweet Potatoes Bread Butter Tomato Jelly Salad Peach Pudding Cream

THE RECIPES

Escalloped Tuna and Celery (Serving Three) 3 tablespoons butter 4 tablespoons flour 2 cups milk 2-3 cup tuna 1/2 cup diced celery, cooked 2 tablespoons chopped pimientos 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon paprika 1 teaspoon finely chopped parsley Melt butter and add flour, when blended add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add rest of ingredients, pour into buttered, shallow baking dish. Cover with crumbs.

Crumbs

1/2 cup crumbs 3 tablespoons butter, melted Mix ingredients, sprinkle over top of tuna mixture. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which baked.

Peach Padding

1 1/2 cups flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 4 tablespoons sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 4 tablespoons fat 1 egg 1/2 cup milk Mix dry ingredients. Cut in fat with knife. Add rest of ingredients, mixing lightly. Spread soft dough over peach mixture.

Peach Mixture

2 cups peaches 2-3 cup sugar 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon cloves 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup water or peach juice 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract 1 tablespoon butter Blend peaches with sugar, spices, salt and flour. Add rest of ingredients. Pour into buttered shallow pan, cover with crust and make 4 holes in top. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Serve warm or cold.

Cranberry Jelly

4 cups berries 1 1/2 cups water 2 cups sugar Boil berries and water until berries are soft. Press through strainer. Add sugar and boil 2 minutes. Pour into a glass dish. Cool and chill.

Creole Sauce 3 tablespoons butter 3 tablespoons flour 1 1/2 cups milk 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon paprika 2 tablespoons chopped pimientos 2 tablespoons green peppers 1 egg or 2 yolks Melt butter and add flour. When blended add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add rest of ingredients, cook one minute.

Pumpkin Filling (For 8 Tarts)

2 cups pumpkin, cooked 2-3 cup sugar 1/4 cup dark brown sugar 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 2-3 teaspoon cloves 2-3 teaspoon nutmeg 2-3 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 2 eggs 2 cups milk Mix ingredients and pour into deep, unbacked tart cases. Bake 3 minutes in hot oven. Lower fire and bake 20 minutes in moderately slow oven. Let tarts cool in pans. Then they can be lifted out easily, using knife and fork. Serve tarts on paper doilies. Deep muffin pans or custard cups can be used for baking.
