

School District Levies Are Compiled for 1933

School district tax levies for 1933 have been compiled by the county assessor's office, for extension on the tax rolls, in due season.

Completion of the state and county levies, awaits final action by the state legislature fixing the state tax.

The state tax commission has made the prediction that the state tax will be lower. The formal order on the tax levy will be signed by the county court as soon as this action is taken.

The school levies for districts generally show an increase, ranging from fractional rises to trebling of the 1932 school levy. The levy is main-

tenance of schools, warrant or bonded indebtedness, and establishes a tax base. Increased levies in some districts have been due to an increase in the school population the last two years.

Heaviest levy increases were in the Evans valley, Shady Cove, Trall, North Trall, Elk Creek, Rogue River, Pinehurst, and Butte Falls districts. Decreases in school levy were made in Mt. Pitt, North Phoenix, Prospect, Meadows, Siskiyou, Brownsboro, Debeneger Grap, Hatchery, Little Applegate, West Side, Coleslin and Howard districts.

Medford Scores

Following this, the Medford rooters came to their feet yelling, "We want a touchdown!" Their wish was fulfilled for it wasn't a minute later until the mighty Tigers swept down the field under the plunging of Bill Bates and slicing of Max Gillinsky. Bill pounded away at the line and placed the ball on the three-yard stripe, and Gillinsky dove through an opening in the line for the touch-

line and attracted the attention of the Ben backfield defense, while Gillinsky shot a short pass to Brown standing on the goal line, who applied the "liquid catch," the air being so cold that it was impossible for him to hang on to the ball. Numerous fumbles had occurred from the same cause for Bend and Medford alike, but both teams managed to cover their own fumbles.

Gillinsky Returns Kick

At kickoff of the second half, Gillinsky, behind perfect interference, carried the ball back 45 yards, where he was forced out of bounds. The very instant Gillinsky received the ball, his teammates started cutting

would pile up in a mass that looked the size of a mountain, but finally weakened with the consistent pounding of the backs and the iron man drive of the line. Gillinsky made the touchdown from the three-yard line.

Last Quarter Hectic

The fourth quarter was an exciting phase. Medford completed some very snappy passes to Bob Hinman, who, in trying to get away from his tacklers, was forced to be content with a yard less in the way of gain than formerly. Medford started on a rampage that brought excited rooters to their feet when, on the exchange of passes, Baker for Medford grabbed the narrow end of the pike in his fingers planted the cleats of his shoes firmly in the sawdust of Van Scoyoc field and wren racing down the field with one man between him and the goal line. Baker almost got away but didn't succeed in shaking loose his left foot, which was firmly held by Marsden, the Lava Bear's flashy end. The ball was deep in Bend territory when the gun ended the game and gave Medford the mythical state championship of Oregon.

Medford predominated in everything except passes and punts.
