Liquor Import Policy Decided

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The executive commercial policy committee, representing four governmental departments, decided today to allow importation of liquors from foreign countries for a four months' period on quotas based on the 1910-1914 average for each country.

This committee, one of many in the administration working on the covary program in general, is concentrating especially with ways and means of making foreign trade flourish. On it are officials of the state, commerce and agriculture department and of the treasury. Secretary Wallace, who recently conferred with President Roosevelt at Warm Springs, had a hand in today's meeting.

The import policy becomes effective when repeal comes into force next Tuesday.

JACKSON COUNTY FIFTH IN PEAR PRODUCTION OF COUNTRY, SAYS CENSUS

Some interesting figures released from Washington by the department of commerce, bureau of the census, show that the pear crop of the United States represented 4.9 per cent of the value of all fruits and nuts harvested.

The 50 leading pear countries in the United States are ranked according to the number of trees of bearing age. Twenty-two of the countries are located in California and 11 in New York. Yakima county, Washington, leads the list, followed by Sacramento, Placer and Santa Clara counties, California, and Jackson county, Oregon.

Taking fifth place in the nation, Jackson county showed reports from 1,012 farms with 196,459 trees, not of bearing age, and 568,314 of bearing age. From these trees 1,833,133 bushels of pears were harvested, valued at \$3,207,968.

Further on, he wrote:

DETROIT, Dec. 1.—(UP)—The Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, militant priest, reiterated today that "I have nothing whatever to retract and will retract nothing" in connection with his statement early this week that Alfred E. Smith had approached the House of Morgan for a loan in financing the Empire State building.

Father Coughlin's reiteration came in answer to a statement by John J. Haskob, one of the financiers of the building, who said all arrangements for financing had been made before Smith became connected with the building, and had asked an apology from the priest.

"Not later than an hour ago," said Coughlin, "I talked with the bishop of the Roman Catholic church, who accompanied Smith on his trip from the Empire State building to the House of Morgan at Wall and Broadway streets. The bishop had just read Haskob's statement."

"Stick to your guns—retract nothing," the bishop counseled me. "Nothing you said last Sunday was outside the facts as they happened in my presence. Sooner or later Mr. Smith will come to recall the incident."

"Beyond this I do not care to say anything in answer to Haskob," the priest had stated in his address in New York that Smith was accompanied to the Morgan office by "a bishop and another clergyman."
