ROOSEVELT UPS GOLD 8 CENTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—(AP)—The government gold price was raised again today for a new high of \$34.01 an ounce, an eight-cent increase over Wednesday's figure.

The new price represents a 25-cent increase in the last three business days.

The new upward movement came at a time when the dollar and government bonds had shown strength despite the recent rapid rise in reconstruction corporation quotations.

Today's figure compares with a London price of \$32.87 an ounce announced on an opening sterling quotation of \$5.20 1/2.
