

PAY CWA WORKERS; ADDITIONAL WORK IN COUNTY ASKED

Jobs for 370 More Near — \$2675 Disbursed for Half Week's Work — Forty New Projects Outlined

With money in their pockets again and smiles on their faces, 325 Jackson county men returned to their homes last night, each with his share of the \$2675.76 disbursed in United States treasury warrants on the first pay day at projects approved here by the civil works administration.

The men receiving pay were working on the Rogue River, Talent, Medford and Eagle Point irrigation districts, the Evans Valley and Same Valley roads, the Dead Indian road, in Ashland city park, Hagradine cemetery, Reter dam and on Medford streets.

These 11 projects were approved last week by the civil works administration committee for Oregon. Forty additional projects approved by the local civil works administration committee were forwarded to Portland headquarters last night for consideration of the state committee.

Through the list of new projects, if approved is granted, the city of Ashland will receive men for work on the public library, streets, the high school and Washington school. Work is also recommended in Applegate school district, Butte Falls, districts 21 and 22, City of Central Point, streets; Gold Hill irrigation district, city of Jacksonville, Phoenix school district, Rogue River, for bridge school ward's creek, streets and school district in Jackson county on roads north and south of Medford and east of the Eagle Point district.

Additional help in the county agents' and the home demonstration agents' offices is also included in the program, both to be feminine workers.

Other school districts listed for projects are: Forest Creek, No. 43; Crater Lake, No. 53; Wagner Creek, No. 55; Watkins, No. 56; Bellevue, No. 75; Howard, No. 100; Trall, No. 31; Talent, No. 22; Griffin Creek, No. 2; Agate, No. 16; Derby, No. 31; and Siskiyou, No. 38.

The Roxy Ann park project and the Bear Creek improvement were recommended for the city of Medford. Additional help for the Jackson county library system was also advised and increased aid in the Welfare Exchange, both to be feminine workers.

The Southern Oregon Experiment station at Talent, and Talent streets were listed for labor, and the Butte Falls streets.

A number of applications for projects were received here too late Friday for consideration of the committee, so were not forwarded to Portland. The committee, however, will try to give them attention in the near future. It was stated yesterday, it is still possible that the committee will be in a position to send more men out on jobs in this county later on.

JOHN BARNEBURG, PIONEER, FORMER OFFICIAL, PASSES

John Barneburg passed away at his late home, 19 North Orange street in this city, early Friday morning after a short illness due to an auto injury received several weeks ago. The deceased resigned as county commissioner of this county at the close of last year due to ill health. Henry Barneburg of this city, a brother, and three sisters, Mrs. Byron Nichol of Upton, Cal., Mrs. Ralph Clarke, and Mrs. Dr. J. M. Keene—both of this city, also survive.

Funeral services for the public will be held at the Peri Funeral Home next Monday at 2 p. m. The funeral sermon will be conducted by Rev. Hamilton. Interment will be made in the Siskiyou Memorial park. Ware and his wife, Andrea's mother, arrived here late last night to assist in the search for the two young women, who have been missing since they started from here to Klamath Falls, Ore., November 11. The desolate Scab Rock country between Connell, Wash., southwest of here, where the girls were seen at midnight on November 11, and Pasco, Wash., is being marked off preparatory to a thorough air search. In the meantime a searching party headed by Sheriff N. J. Baillie of Franklin county, set out from Pasco this morning to conduct a ground search of the area. Sheriff G. O. Miles has expressed the belief the girls light coupe had plunged off the highway into the Columbia river near Pasco. The Misses Mardelle and Sparks absent several days in Medford during the middle of October, where they were giving demonstrations of a new type of makeup.

NEW POSTMASTER ON JOB BY JAN. 1 DEMOCRATS HOPE

Warner's Commission Expires December 18 and Aspirants Seek Action—DeSouza Has 'Inside'

Allotment of the fattest plum for distribution in Jackson county—the Medford postmastership—at the hands of the "New Deal" Democracy, is forecast as coming within the month, and in time for the appointee to take up the burdens of the federal job by January 1, or shortly thereafter.

The commission of William M. Warner, incumbent, expires December 18. In the interests of efficiency during the Christmas rush, he is not apt to be displaced until the greatest labor period of the year is finished. Postmaster Warner last August completed 30 years of postal service under the civil service, and is subject to retirement on pay under the emergency economy legislation. Warner started the first rural free delivery route established in the county and has advanced over the years, with the rank of assistant postmaster and then postmaster. He has held the post for 13 years. The retiring fund is made up of contributions from postal employees and by the civil service.

Vacancies will also occur in the Ashland postoffice and the Gold Hill postoffice the first quarter of the coming year.

Fred Wagner is the Ashland postmaster. The name of John H. Fuller is mentioned as his probable successor.

Mrs. Nellie Reed is the Gold Hill postmistress. H. D. Reed is mentioned as the probable appointee in the down river town.

Both Mrs. Reed and Wagner are Republicans. Their successors will be "old line" Democrats, according to word from Washington, D. C. The Democracy of all appointees will date back before the Hoover administration and the depression.

For the Medford postmastership, Attorney Frank De Souza is rated as having the "inside track." He is county chairman, close to the state Democratic leaders, and his Democracy runs back to his first vote. He was battling in Jackson county for Democratic victory when members of that faith were few and far between. He even fought for the party in the county postoffice. Postmaster General Farley, who has the final say, is now in Europe. He expects to be back in America by Christmas. Medford has not had a Democratic postmaster since 1920. Then Postmaster General A. S. Burleson named an old North Carolina friend to the job. The local Democratic grief knew no bounds as they felt a tried and true Jackson county follower of Jefferson should have the post. The Republicans were returned to power, and Warner was named by Harding and Coolidge.

BONNEVILLE DAM PROGRESS PLEASES

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 2.—(AP)—Belief that the \$31,000,000 power and navigation dam across the Columbia river at Bonneville will come up to the full expectations of those who sought it, was expressed here today by Major General Edward M. Markham, chief of the United States army engineers, after a personal inspection of the project. "I was surprised and pleased," General Markham said in commenting on the dam. "I came here expecting to inspect a site and found a job in swing. The progress is gratifying. I am confident the Bonneville dam will fill all your expectations, both in employment and speed." The general arrived here today from Glasgow, Mont., where he inspected the Fort Peck reservoir. He went on a tour of inspection to the Bonneville dam site with Colonel Thomas M. Robins of San Francisco, divisional army engineer; Major C. F. Williams, division engineer; C. L. Grimm, chief civilian engineer in charge of the Bonneville project, and consulting staff engineers of the Portland district office.

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2 CHECK FORGERS GET SALEM CELLS ON GUILTY PLEAS

Three bogus check writers were taken before Judge Harry D. Norton in circuit court Saturday, one receiving a sentence of three years to the state penitentiary, another a sentence to the same prison for two and one-half years, and the third, who entered a guilty plea, is being held until his record can be investigated further.

Phillip M. Shuus, arrested October 28 by city police, after passing a worthless check at the East Side Pharmacy, was sentenced to three years in the state penitentiary. Shuus had served jail sentences in Seattle, according to police.

Dick B. Warren, 29, who wrote a check to "T. L. Marsden" for sixteen dollars and forged the name of "H. M. Welschlar, 104 South Newton," entered a guilty plea, but sentence was not passed until Warren's record could be investigated further. Warren had served some time in Monroe reformatory in Washington, police said.

A sentence of two and one-half years was imposed on Victor D. LaCombe, 32, alias Fred C. Leighton, a bookkeeper, who was arrested Friday by state police on charges of obtaining money under false pretenses. LaCombe entered a guilty plea.

According to arresting officers, LaCombe went to a local bank and deposited a check for \$400, drawn on the Crocker National bank of San Francisco. A check book and pass book were issued him on the same day, and a number of checks, totaling \$72.10 were drawn on the account. It developed that LaCombe, who was using the name of "Leighton," did not have an account in the San Francisco bank.

At the time of his arrest LaCombe was reading with some people in the Williams creek section, where he posed as a consulting engineer.

He told state police that he was paroled from San Quentin in August, 1933, having been sentenced there October 3, 1931, on check charges, to serve from 1 to 14 years. His record shows that he cashed about \$248 in payroll checks, and others, in various sums. Included in the list were one in San Francisco for \$20, two in Woodlands for \$15 and \$22, two in Marysville for \$5 and \$10, several in Napa totaling about \$39, and in Red Bluff for about \$45.

FEHL BUILDING IS PURCHASED BY KIN AT SHERIFF'S SALE

The Pacific Record-Herald building on Sixth street, formerly owned by E. H. Fehl, and where he published the weekly, was sold Saturday morning at a sheriff's sale to Mrs. Coritha E. Stalley. Mrs. Stalley bid \$5000 and was the only bidder. The sale was described by the sheriff's office as a legal formality, "to clear the title." Mrs. Stalley is a mother-in-law of the former county official, now serving four years in state prison for ballot theft conspiracy conviction.

Roy A. Parr, former game warden, was awarded a \$15,000 judgment against Fehl and the Pacific Record-Herald, on a criminal libel charge. Parr sold the \$15,000 judgment against Fehl to Mrs. Stalley last spring, for \$1500. It was reported at the time. A certificate of levy was issued to Mrs. Stalley, and her purchase Saturday gives her a clear title. No money changed hands in the transaction.

For years the Pacific Record-Herald ran wild with accusations against public officials, without regard to facts or truth, and was the fountain head of the Jackson county turmoil.

INSULL'S BROTHER BACK TO ILLINOIS

TORONTO, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The appeal of Cook county, Illinois, for the return of Martin J. Insull to factory in connection with the collapse of the Insull utilities system was granted today by Justice A. C. Kingston of the Ontario supreme court.

The legal battle for his extradition, which began October 6, 1932, when he was arrested at Barrie, Ont., will go into its final phase Friday, when Justice H. H. Davis hears a motion for his release under a writ of habeas corpus.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 2.—(AP)—John A. Peacock, 23, of West Sound, Wash., near Seattle, was arrested here today by state and local police for a motor fuel holdup at Albany.

YULE OPENING OF MEDFORD STORES ATTRACTS THROGG

Three weeks from tonight Santa Claus is scheduled to make his traditional journey down the chimneys of the land. And just as he won't be forced to leave any empty stockings Medford got ready for his coming Friday night. Stores displaying gifts to fill his pack staged their annual Christmas opening and guests from all sections of the valley crowded the streets to gain a first glimpse of what mamma, papa, baby and "Aunt Emma" will expect on the Christmas tree.

The suggestions, highlighted in the windows, drew additional shoppers into the city yesterday and all indications last night pointed to "a regular Christmas" in the Rogue River valley.

The Friday program opened with music by the high school band, which assembled at the Chamber of Commerce under the direction of F. Wilson Walt to continue through the business section serenading all stores. Christmas carols, broadcast by station KMED, also added beauty to the annual occasion, and streets decked with fragrant cedar boughs and Yuletide symbols inflated the holiday spirit in all.

The crowds continued window shopping until a late hour in spite of the heavy fog, which gave a London air to the event.

Reckless Driver Fined. Henry L. Nutting of the Rogue River national forest, arrested November 25 by city police on a reckless driving charge, appeared in city court yesterday. He entered a plea of guilty to the charge and was fined \$100 by Judge A. D. Curry. That is the maximum fine for such an offense. Nutting allegedly ran into the Rogue River meat company truck.

BUY OUR BUTTER FOR YOUR SCOTCH EXCITES BRITISH

LONDON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Great excitement was created here today by front page accounts of Anglo-American trade negotiations reported inaugurated in Washington.

The Evening News called the negotiations "butter scotch," reporting the deal means the United States will permit imports of Scotch liquors if Great Britain will allow imports of American butter and other dairy products.

American observers of the Anglo-American trade situation pointed out that Denmark, Russia and New Zealand, with Canada just edging in, already monopolized the British butter market and that economic concessions likely will take other lines than any trade pact based upon liquor imports.

(Washington dispatches said the administration was reported prepared to admit 4,000,000 gallons of foreign liquors and wines in exchange for trade concessions.) More than 6,000,000 gallons of Scotch whisky, it was estimated recently, have been purchased by American syndicates and are being held in Scotland for shipment after repeal.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 2.—(AP)—Governor Julius L. Meier today signed extradition papers calling for the return from Salt Lake City of Jack Henry and James Marks to face forgery charges at Klamath Falls.
