Tuberculosis Expensive—Urging support of the program to prevent tuberculosis through purchase of the little Christmas seals, workers here today presented figures showing how expensive the disease is to the country in life and money. "Tuberculosis, like war, claims the victims in the prime of life. It is the leading cause of death in Oregon and in the United States, between 15 and 45 years of age. It costs taxpayers about the same to cure one tuberculous patient as to employ one public health nurse for one year, \$1800."

Two Features On Program At Holly

Double Features Again At Rialto

Another big double feature attraction opens at the Rialto theater tomorrow with "The Power and the Glory" and "Hypnotized" as the two features to be shown. "The Power and the Glory," with Spencer Tracy, Colleen Moore and Frank Morgan in featured roles, was given a four star rating in the Liberty Magazine review, and has had critical raves in every spot it has played. The story of the film cannot be

separated from the method in which it is told. Through a new medium, called "Narrastage," the film depicts the important events in the life of a man who rises from the most humble beginning to a position of great power and influence. It shows his change from a simple young man without any education to a figure of national importance with manifold interests and great wealth. It depicts events which make his life a complicated affair of intrigue, adventure and romance. Spencer Tracy, in the leading role, has the outstanding characterization of his career, and Colleen Moore makes her return to the screen in a role that is far removed from the "hoydenish" ones she once did. "Hypnotized," on the other half of the program, has the Two Black Crows—Moran and Mack—in a spectacular comedy based on the adventures of a circus elephant trainer and his colored helper who are hypnotized by a professional mesmerist and kidnapped and taken aboard an ocean liner. The picture starts with the picturesque backstage atmosphere of a big circus and then the action takes place aboard ship. What Mack Sennett, who produced the picture, can do with an ocean liner and a circus marks about the limit in comedy possibilities. "Flying Devils" and "Brief Moment" play at the Rialto for the last time tonight.
