

BUS, TRUCK BILL SENT TO SENATE WITH HOUSE O. K.

Only Five Opposing Votes in Lower Branch — Old Age Pension Plan Is Also Approved by Representatives

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 7.—(AP)—The bus and truck bill introduced by the joint highway committee passed the house late yesterday with only five dissenting votes.

Apparently weary of arguing the contentious measure, no members objected when debate was cut short. The sentiment appeared to favor sending the measure to the senate for any further amendments.

Those voting against the bill on final passage were Graham, Hilton, Lang, Snyder and Ryan.

For Old Age Pension Plan

Representative Gleason's measure to create an old age pension fund by requiring employer and employee to each pay 1 cent a day was passed by the house. Payments will be remitted monthly to the state industrial commission, which will prorate them to counties on the basis of approved pensioners.

A senate bill to permit reorganization of a bank by vote of two-thirds the stockholders and holders of 75 per cent of the deposits passed the house after a crisp debate.

Veto Sustained

The projected federal supported flax development of the Willamette valley entered discussion of vetoed senate bill 11. The governor's veto was sustained, thus breaking the chain of vetoed senate bills overwhelmingly passed in both houses.

It was a bill prohibiting sale of prison made goods. Representative Snedcor said the bill has already been adopted in 17 states and that Oregon prison made goods, including flax products, are thus not eligible for sale in those states.

Representative Abrams and others opposed adoption of the bill now lest it dampen federal ardor for assisting in Oregon's flax development.

Favor Teeth for Kidnap Law

Senator Chittinock's bill to stiffen kidnaping penalties was approved in the senate. The measure would make kidnaping with intent to extort money, punishable by at least ten years' imprisonment. The present law is silent on the extortion phase.

The customary "gag" rule for waning sessions appeared in the house yesterday. The resolution adopted limited the opening speaker on a measure to 10 minutes and all others to five minutes.

Milk Bill Passes

Senator Ireland's milk utilities bill squeezed through the senate on a 16-to-11 vote with three absent. The bill provides for creation of a milk control commission and regulation of the milk industry. Price fixing and power to dispose of surplus phases were authorized in the measure, which now goes to the house.

Senator Dunne led the fight for the bill, declaring it would stabilize the milk industry in Oregon and save thousands of dairymen from financial ruin.

Senator Spaulding charged the bill was unfair and discriminatory and would operate in the interests of the distributors rather than the producers. Senator Brown said the bill was unfair and would cost the producers \$15,000 a year.

Refer Home Rule

The home rule provision of the state constitution would be referred to the people under a senate bill passed by the senate and sent to the house. The senate approved Senator Dickson's bill to submit to the people a provision that agreement of 10 jurors is sufficient for conviction in lesser criminal cases.

The senate passed a memorial urging the president and congress that \$43,000,000 be allowed for Bonneville dam, part of the amount to be used for construction and power transmission lines. The president was also urged to give preferential consideration to granting additional lumber production quotas where it would assist in the salvage of burned-over timber lands.

Other senate bills approved by the senate provided:

Partial payment of taxes; investment of assets of building and loan associations and savings and loan associations in bonds issued by the Home Owners' Loan corporation; and authority for the state treasurer to contract for interest on daily balances of state money in banks.

MANY MEN BUSY IN COUNTY UNDER BANNER OF CWA

At the present time close to 100 men are working on Jackson county roads under the civil works administration plans, according to County Engineer Rynning. Tomorrow the county expects to have another detachment of workers scheduled to start on road work south of Medford, north of Medford and in the Eagle Point district.

About 100 men are employed under the CWA plan on general improvement work in the irrigation districts.

During the Christmas school vacation men will be dispatched to a number of country school houses for painting, carpentering and general repairs. This will enable the work to be done without conflict with the school sessions. Some of the school houses are in need of painting. Some need carpenter work.

Beneficial results from the CWA projects are noticeable at the court house in the decline of relief applications. It provides work for the

worthy poor and enable the county to take care of its own aged and ill. There have been fewer transient relief applications to date. This is held to be due to Jackson county losing its reputation as "a soft touch" for transient indigents.

WILLAMETTE STUDENTS VOTE IN FAVOR DANCING
