part of McKitrick's revelations were ever brought to public light. Since his incarceration McKitrick has been a trusty with "outside work" duties. Tolleson, former University of Oregon student and tennis star, also has been a trusty, with duties in the fingerprint department. Tolleson checks the personal possessions of convicts upon their arrival and returns them on their departure. He has served his minimum sentence with good behavior allowances. Tolleson pleaded guilty to reporting a fake bank robbery to cover up his own delinquencies. Most of the money was afterwards recovered in a coffee pot at his home, where he had hidden it.

The state parole board is expected to meet the week before Christmas, when it will consider the applications of Tolleson and McKitrick, with dozens of others. At Christmas time, governors have granted pardons and paroles to convicts, generally after they have served long terms, and where there were extenuating circumstances, or because of youth, but seldom for crimes of violence and felonies detrimental to public welfare.

There is no parole hope for Jackson county's life-termers, which include the DeAutremont brothers—Ray, Roy and Hugh, train robbers; Pat Donahoe, habitual criminal; Albert W. Reed of Denver, Colo., assayer of an Ashland policeman; Earl Hanson of Eagle Point, slayer last June of a friend and neighbor, in a fit of drunken temper, and L. A. Banks, murderer. Reed's alleged accomplices in the murder—Paul McQuade and Lee Jackson, indicted for the same killing, have never been apprehended.

# DEFUNCT BANK TO DECLARE DIVIDEND

A petition has been filed with the circuit court for the declaring of dividend No. 4, in the liquidation of the Citizens National bank of Ashland, now in the hands of the state banking board. The petition calls for the payment of \$16,798.33 of commercial deposit claims to 672 depositors, ranging from 25 cents to \$1556.58. The petition cites that funds are now on hand for the payments. Most of the beneficiaries are residents of Ashland. The present liquidation is for 10 per cent. The first dividend was 20 per cent and two for 10 per cent, as is the present dividend.
