CANNED FRUITS TO COST MORE

PORTLAND, Dec. 8.—(AP)—The Journal said today that according to latest information in the trade, increased prices on canned fruits, especially on peaches, at wholesale and retail, are about to be generally announced. One food brokerage company here has received word from large California interests that they have been officially advised that the secretary of agriculture has approved the application of canners for extension of the price guarantee to July 31, 1934, and also for an increase in price effective January 1 for yellow cling peaches.

"This advance will be quoted by all packers at the same time," the paper said, "and the news of the impending boost is expected to create a very liberal demand not only for canned peaches but for other canned fruits and vegetables."

CHINAMAN SOUGHT IN RANCH SLAYING

HANFORD, Cal., Dec. 8.—(AP)—Shot at least four times by an unknown assailant as he lay in his bed, J. J. McCarty, 74, Kings county rancher, died early today, two hours after the attack.

Deputy Sheriff T. De Shazo said the attacker stood beside the aged rancher's bed and shot him while he slept. Four empty cartridges from an automatic revolver were found on the bedroom floor.

Shortly before his death McCarty was reported to have muttered something "about a Chinaman." His widow, who was asleep when McCarty was shot, explained he recently had had trouble with a Chinese, Fong Sing, who had rented a small ranch from him.

Officers began a search for Fong Sing.
