

HUBBELLS HURLING FEATURE OF PAST BASEBALL SEASON

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—(AP)—The brilliant pitching that carried the New York Giants' "hitless" team to the 1933 world championship is emphasized more than ever in the official pitching averages of the National League.

Led by Carl Hubbell the entire Giant staff of mound regulars appeared well up in the list as based on the earned run averages. Hubbell allowed an average of only 1.66 earned runs per nine-inning game while hurling 869 innings, the equivalent of more than 34 full contests. Not since 1923 had any National League hurler been under two in the earned run average. Behind Hubbell, Hal Schumacher, the big youngster from Dolgeville, N. Y., was third with a 2.15 average; Fred Fitzsimmons was eleventh at 8.69 and Leroy (Bud) Parmelee was 15th at 3.18.

The Chicago Cubs were the leading threats to the Giants' supremacy as Lon Warneke, the 1932 leader, took second place with a 2.01 average; Guy Bush was fourth with 2.59 and Charley Root fifth with 2.60. Jerome (Dizzy) Dean of St. Louis shared the season's individual honors with the New York southpaw. He set a new "modern" record for strikeouts in a single game by whiffing 17 Chicago batters on July 30. The best previous mark since 1900 was 16, made by Christy Mathewson, Nap Rucker and Frank Hahn. "Dizzy" fanned 199 rivals in the course of 48 games, leading for the second straight year, and tied with Warneke for the league lead by pitching 26 complete games.

GAELS FAVORITES OVER METHODISTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Rolling from Dallas, Texas, the football Mustangs of Southern Methodist university arrive here today for their battle at Kezar stadium tomorrow with the St. Mary's college Gaels. The Gaels, though rated as 2½ to 1 favorite by their San Francisco followers, were reported less strongly backed on their own campus in the Moraga hills across the bay. The campus odds were listed at 10 to 9, the students apparently becoming cautious after the Gaels' Thanksgiving day defeat by Oregon, another short-ender in the wagers.

FINAL GAME FOR FIFTEEN TROJANS

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 8.—(AP)—Fifteen Southern California football players, who will be participating in their last game for Troy when they meet Washington here tomorrow looked to their final workout today with the hope that they might finish a great three years with a victory. These 15 gridsters, seven of them on the starting lineup, have tasted defeat only twice in 32 games, including two Rose Bowl engagements. Coach Howard Jones planned only a light workout for them this afternoon. Tonight they will break bread with members of the Washington team at the annual alumni banquet and then tomorrow go out to tackle a team of Huskies bent on finishing a rather unsuccessful year with a rousing win over one of Troy's greatest aggregations.

JEWISH ART, MUSIC STUDENTS BARRED

BERLIN, Germany, Dec. 8.—(UP)—A decree was issued by the Prussian ministry of education today, barring non-Aryan (Jewish) students from art schools and music institutes. Children of men who fought at the front during the world war were excepted.

In any case, however, non-Aryans are not to exceed 1.5 per cent of the total number of students at any given school. That is the relation of Jewish population to the total population of Germany.

AX STRIKES ANKLE OF ROGUE RIVER WOMAN

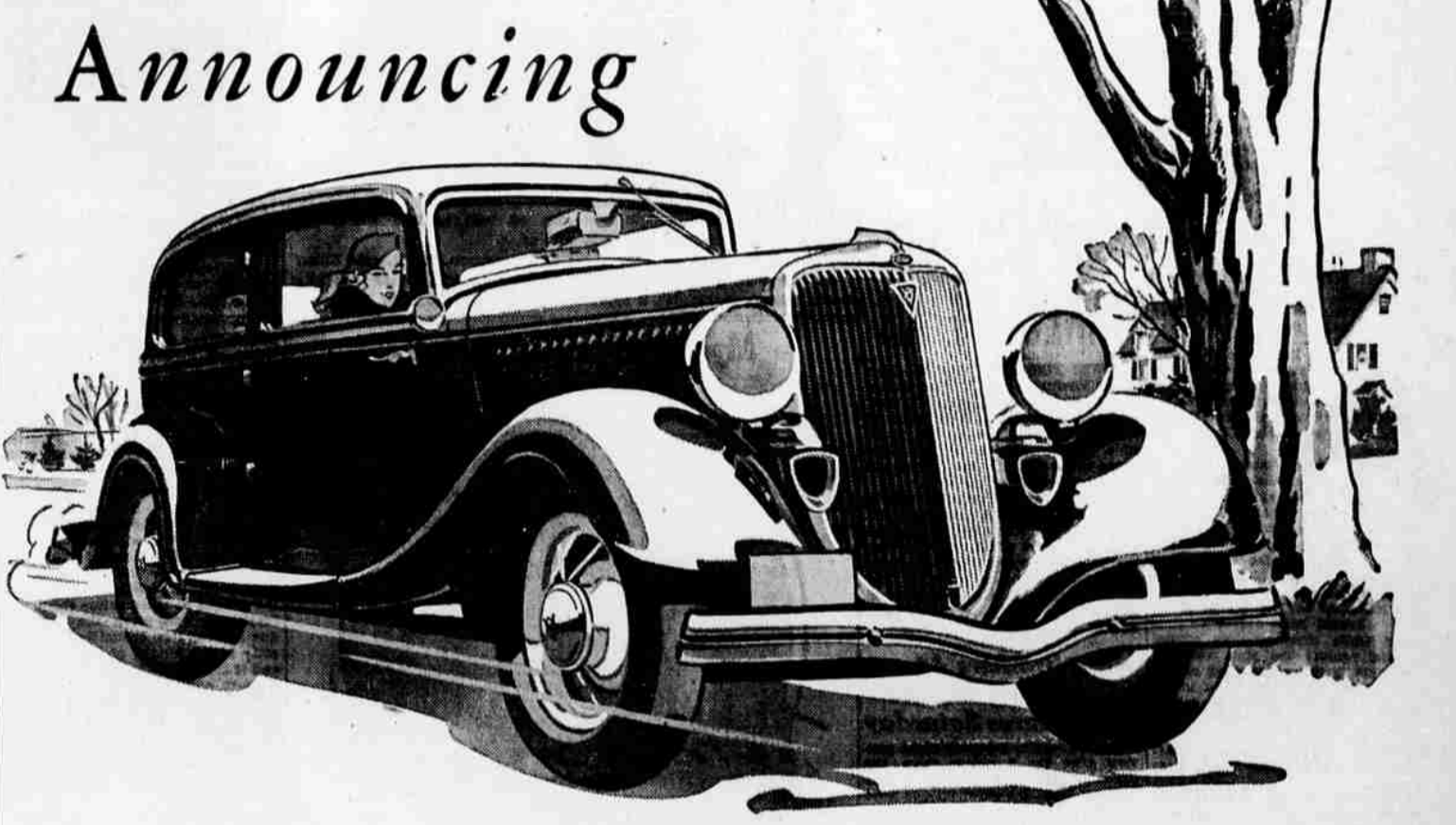

ULYSSES NOT OBSCENE SAYS FEDERAL JUDGE

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—(UP)—Federal Judge John M. Woolsey ruled today that the book "Ulysses" by James Joyce, is neither pornographic nor obscene, and that it may be admitted to the United States without further

interference from the customs authorities. The book has been excluded for some years and repeated attempts to get the courts to admit it have failed until today. "The book is a sincere and serious attempt to devise a new literary method for the observation and description of mankind," Judge Woolsey said.
