SALEM, Ore., Dec. 8.—(AP)—Liquor control and sales tax—two of the major issues before the special session of the Oregon legislature—occupied the attention of the two houses on the 19th day of their limited 20-day assembly.

While the senate launched on an intensive debate on the much amended Knox plan for state owned stores in the handling of alcoholic beverages with much verbal argumentation made supporting the contention of the attorney general the measure was unconstitutional, the house took initial action on the one and one-half per cent sales tax for school relief.

Senate Talks Liquor And while state senators argued for and against the state entering the liquor business, members of the lower house, just across the lobby, for the third time this year, talked upon the sales tax principle in the face of the defeat landed the general sales tax before the voters last July. Galleries of both houses were crowded.

Vote on both these proposals was expected before noon, but until most members had expressed themselves on the floor. The "gag" rule in the house aided in expediting the discussion on the tax bill, but the senate was unlimited and at noon today only two members of the upper house—John D. Goswami and Jay Upton—had spoken upon the liquor measure, both in opposition to the state entering the business under the present proposal.

Knox Bill Faces Delay The liquor bill had been approved by the house, but in its amended form it would have to go back for confirmation and probably into conference committee when, and if, it does pass the senate.

E. C. McCormack, Lane county representative, opened the debate on the sales tax, declaring it an emergency measure for schools and as such should be supported by the people. Opposition was voiced by some members on the ground that

In January the special session failed to pass a sales tax, later at the regular session one was passed but the voters rejected it by a four-to-one vote.

Like California Law The sales tax bill, as finally brought into the house, is modeled closely after the California law. There would be no tax on personal or professional service or wages. The tax would be passed on to the ultimate consumer, and was expected to raise \$3,500,000 annually. The act would be in effect two years only.

Senator Goswami fired the opening gun in the battle of the bottles when he moved to re-commit the bill to the committee on alcoholic control. He declared his main purpose was the enactment of legislation to take the profit out of the liquor business and provide a stamp tax. In the event of such a tax he proposed that the amount paid in license or sales tax be rebated. He favored the change on the ground that it did not commit the state to any large amendment or to provide groundwork for a big political machine.
