

ASSESSOR FIGURES NON-HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT MILLAGE

The tax millage for non-high school districts of Jackson county have been compiled by the assessor's office.

Howard district has the highest millage at 42.4 mills, which includes 7.4 mills assessed for water bonds. Other leaders are Dewey with 40 mills, Derby with 35.1 mills; Sams Valley with 34.8 mills; Sterling, 30.7 mills; Reese Creek, 29.9 mills; Evans Valley, 30.3 mills; Little Butte, 31.6 mills; Pinehurst, 34.9 mills and Shady Cove, 39.3 mills.

The consolidated levy, as given below includes the state and county levy of 14.4 mills, and the high school levy of 5.6 mills, and the special district school levy, as follows:

TURKEY GROWERS HOLD FOR RAISE

PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—(P)—The Journal said today the prevailing bids of 13 to 14 cents a pound for No. 1 dressed toms and turkey hens at country points "are not at all reflected in the current trade in Portland or in California."

Local sales of turkeys to retailers, even in small lots, are not generally above 14 to 15 cents for top toms, and 16 cents as an extreme for hens. Although receipts here are light, retailers have yet refused to rush in with their bids for holiday needs.

UNCLE SAM WILL BUY EXCESS EGGS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Definite confirmation of the government's plan to purchase liberal supplies of eggs for relief purposes was received here today by George C. Keane, general manager of the Pacific Poultry Producers' association.

A message to Keane from the association's New York office said the federal relief corporation is setting aside \$225,000,000 with which to purchase storage eggs. The purchases will be allotted to the several states according to surplus, and with a view of the unemployment problems of each.

Keane said he was advised purchases will be made by the state administrators after consultation with a representative of the state agricultural college and the state department of agriculture.

HEAVY PRUNE EXPORT SHIPMENTS REPORTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12.—(AP)—More than 27,000,000 pounds of prunes have been shipped from Portland by water this year. During November the volume amounted to 9,225,307 pounds.

Germany took \$5,815,122 pounds, valued at \$260,948, last month. The United Kingdom was the second best customer, taking 1,820,540 pounds, worth \$91,292. Poland received 716,435 pounds, valued at \$35,343.

FARLEY ASSURES PARIS ON DOLLAR

PARIS, Dec. 12.—(P)—James A. Farley, United States postmaster-general, here on a vacation, reassured American business men in Paris today that the dollar was sound, and praised President Roosevelt's handling of the monetary situation.

"I had a big surprise," he said, "when I found that the dollar did not get me as much as I thought it would."

"However, I am not disturbed," the postmaster-general said. Roosevelt "knows much more about what his critics have in mind than they know what he has in his mind."

COLORFUL RENO MAYOR DIES OF STOMACH ILL

RENO, Nev., Dec. 12.—(UP)—E. E. Roberts, liberal mayor of Reno for the past ten years, died here yesterday after a long illness. He would have been 63 tomorrow. A stomach ailment hastened his death.

Mayor Roberts led the movement to make Reno the most liberal city in the prohibition era of the United States.

ICKES AND DERN OUT OF ACTION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(P)—Two members of the Roosevelt cabinet, Secretaries Dern and Ickes, who are confined in separate government hospitals, were described by their physicians today as resting comfortably but each "out of action" for at least a week.

Ickes, who fractured a rib yesterday when he slipped on the ice in front of his home, was described at the naval hospital as having passed the most painful stage of his injury. But after an examination of the interior secretary this morning, the doctor attending him said:

"He'll have to stay in bed for at least a week or ten days. No, he can't even think of doing any work in bed for some days yet."

At Walter Reed hospital, where the secretary of war is recovering from an eye infection, the army doctors reported:

"He's doing very well. Both eyes are slightly infected and that will necessitate rest. While fairly comfortable, his recovery would be retarded if he thought of doing any work for several days yet."
