WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—(AP)—Henry Morgenthau, Jr., acting secretary of the treasury, again denied today reports of negotiations for a currency stabilization agreement with Great Britain and France. Shortly after the government had repeated the price of \$34.01 an ounce for the twelfth successive day, Morgenthau told news men there was nothing in new reports of stabilization despite reports of 5 to 6 betting odds in Wall Street on early action. Asked specifically about a statement by Senator Thomas (D. Okla.) that negotiations with the Bank of England were understood to be heading in dollar stabilization at 62 cents, Morgenthau said:

"I don't know anything about it."

DRUNKEN PASSENGER  
GETS JAIL SENTENCE

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 14.—(AP)—A 30-day jail sentence for drunkenness on a public highway was imposed here yesterday on Leon Ginnis of Metzger, passenger in the car which collided with a machine driven by Robert McBride of Portland, killing him. Ginnis entered a plea of guilty. A charge of involuntary manslaughter has been placed against C. E. Moe, driver of the car in which Ginnis was riding. Moe, injured in the wreck, is still in a hospital here. The accident occurred December 6 north of here.

SCHOOL TEACHERS  
PLANNED FOR CCC

According to an article appearing in the latest edition of "Happy Days," official national publication of the Civilian Conservation Corps, Robert Fechner, head of the emergency conservation work has announced that a civilian education supervisor is to be appointed for each of the CCC camps throughout the United States. There will be 1468 school teachers appointed, according to "Happy Days" and the educators will be selected with the aid of the state education officials in each state where the camps are located. All instructors will be men.

A civilian education administrator will be placed on duty at each corps area headquarters. Although the classes to be conducted are not compulsory, Captain Harold E. Stow, publicity and welfare officer for this district said today that already 102 men at one of the camps in this district had requested education opportunities.

GEORGE W. DEWEY

George Wesley Dewey died at his home, 39 North Peach street, Wednesday morning after an illness covering the past seven months of arduous schoolwork. He was born in Jersey county, Illinois, October 12, 1868. His parents moved from Illinois to the Sacramento valley, California, in his youth. He came to Jackson county as a young man, and had been a resident of the county for 43 years. Mr. Dewey was married to Eva Robison at Talent, Oregon, December 31, 1891. Five children were born to the union.

He is survived by his wife Eva and one son and one daughter, Orville of Medford, Mrs. Fern Crump, Jacksonville, Ore., one brother, Charles Sebring, Colfax, Calif., a sister, Mrs. Mamie Mitchell, Oakland, Calif., and three grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at the Perl Funeral Home Friday at 10:30 a. m., Rev. W. J. Howell officiating. Interment in Wagner Creek cemetery.

Woe Is Fistian! Baer Won't Be Back

Somebody Else Will Have to Clip Carnera Since Max Went Hollywood

NEW YORK.—(AP)—It was a sad, sad day for fistianas when Max Adelbert Baer, the finest heavyweight prospect this country has produced in many a day, paraded his brawny beauty before a movie camera. They're saying now that Max, of the curly hair and avelte proportions, never again will climb between the ropes—that is, unless the cameras are grinding and Max's makeup is faultless.

Reports from the box office reveal that the former Livermore Butcher Boy has scored a real, unbridged success in his first cinema adventure. They're calling him a "find," and not because he does any particularly fancy fighting. In fact, some of the boxing experts, pressed into service as movie critics here, found all kinds of fault with his ring technique.

A Minor Detail. "Looks that," one of them growled as Max mixed it up with Primo Carnera in the screen. "Why, he's wide open for a good left. If he'd done that against Schmeling he'd landed right square in my lap!"

But fortunately for Max's movie career, he wasn't fighting Schmeling at the time and, besides, he no longer has to worry about any sports writer's opinion. Max's appeal, as the romantic lover, is to the ladies. They know acting. The big fellow is so good in the play's more tender moments, in fact, that his new bosses aren't even worrying about getting a fight sequence in his next production. Those shoulders, those windrows of sparkling teeth, those eyes—but why bore the fair fans with a vulgar prize fight!

Wouldn't Be Bright. With the kind of movie he can collect in Hollywood, it doubtless would seem very silly to Baer to return to the boxing business. Even if he would like to whip Carnera and bear himself called "champ" and gain renown as the man who brought the title back to the good old U. S. A., it still would seem a little silly.

First, it would call for a lot of training, where as Max can go along movie heroing in odd moments and still have himself a whole of a time collecting breath of promise suits. If you don't think that appeals to the boy from the golden west, you don't know your M. Baer.

Secondly, when he finally did get Carnera in the ring he would have to take the short end of the purse, which is distasteful under the best conditions. Too, he would be running a chance of getting his features scrambled to where they wouldn't let him inside the studio gate.

So, the chances are great that fistianas is in for a period of mourning. It can't recapture the Max who stood under the showers at Yankee stadium last summer, a savage fighting man who just had pounded Schmeling into human wreckage, and shouting he was going to do the same thing to that (censored) Carnera.

Max's beauty was not born to blush for long among the cauliflowerers.
