DEATH OF TEN IN SCHOOL BUS EYED

CRESCENT CITY, Fla., Dec. 15.—(AP)—A coroner's inquest was called today to fix the responsibility for the train-school bus crash, which yesterday killed 10 children and injured about 30 others.

It was feared the death list would mount as nine children, ranging from 11 to 17 years of age, lay in Palatka hospitals suffering from cuts and other injuries.

D. R. Niles, the 65-year-old bus driver, who swerved his vehicle into the path of a freight train in an early morning fog, was in a serious condition.

CHRISTMAS MAILING HINTS ARE GIVEN BY POSTOFFICE BULLETIN

With the time here for the mailing of Christmas packages, Joseph C. Mahoney, first assistant postmaster-general, has issued some information for early mailing, stating that during the holiday season the volume of mail increases approximately 200 per cent.

The postmaster requests persons not to mail Christmas greeting cards in red, green or other dark colored envelopes, or in very small envelopes.

Concerning special delivery, the circular says that the use of a special delivery stamp will assure delivery on Christmas day, if mailed at the proper time.
