

MOHR IS ELECTED PRESIDENT STATE HORTICULTURISTS

The Oregon State Horticultural society closed its 48th annual session here yesterday with election of John Mohr of Hood River as president and the selection of Hood River as the 1934 meeting city.

Other officers elected were: O. T. McWhorter, of Corvallis, secretary-treasurer; F. E. Chambers of Eugene, first vice president; Elmer Chastain of Milton-Freewater, second vice president; and Gordon Voonhies of Medford, third vice president. Glenn B. Marsh of Hood River was named a director, to serve with Howard Merriam of Goshen and R. R. Reter of this city.

The by-laws were amended to provide for election of district vice-presidents, with powers to call district meetings between the annual meetings, to keep interest high throughout the year.

In a resolution adopted unanimously, the Elks lodge of this city was thanked for extending the use of quarters for holding the sessions; the Chamber of Commerce was thanked for splendid co-operation, and the out-of-town speakers for their contributions.

The two-day session was well attended and Dean W. B. Schoenfeld of the Oregon experiment station; W. B. Hoxley, secretary of the Northwest Fruit Industry; Prof. E. L. Patton and W. A. Hutchins brought words of constructive federal program, now shaping for the benefit of the farmer and fruit grower.

All the speakers brought messages of substantial cheer for the future and told of aims pointing to lessening of the stress in agriculture and horticulture. Improvement of markets under minimum prices, extension of government production credit, and enlargement of the canned pear markets were explained. The dietetic value of pears was also explained.

The daily attendance averaged between 125 and 150, and horticulturists manifested keen interest in the addresses.

All those little twists and turns in raised gold with lace patterns are not so weird. A vivid blue card with long silver lettering and a tiny and plain decoration is one of the new ideas.
