H. B. 20—By McAleer. Providing applicant for old age pension in an institution be considered a resident of the county from which sent.

H. B. 26—By Hilton and Lewis. Taxing public utilities operating without franchises.

H. B. 34—By Judd and Herman. To permit Astoria to raise revenue by licensing and taxing businesses and professions.

H. B. 36—By Snedecor and others. Creating special building fund for each of higher educational institutions.

H. B. 46—By Wyers. Amends old truck and bust law. Reduces schedules of fees for light trucks and provides for seasonal licenses.

H. B. 51—By Herman and Judd. Provides delinquent taxes may be paid in bonds and warrants.

John J. Murphy, one of Ashland's best known native sons, died at his home there this morning after a brief illness.

His parents, John and Mary, crossed the plains in 1853, and settled on the Murphy donation claim south of Ashland, where John J. Murphy was born September 29, 1860, where he lived until 1914, when he and his family moved to Ashland. He has resided there since that time.

Mr. Murphy had always been an active farmer and stockraiser in the valley.
