School Sales Tax Explained

IN answer to many inquiries regarding the provisions of the new sales and public utility tax, we are giving a portion of the summary of the measure, sent out by C. A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction, as follows:

- A. General Explanation
1. A one and one-half per cent tax on retail sales of tangible personal property and utility service. The bill is modeled closely after the California sales tax law. No tax on personal or professional service.
2. Tax to be passed on to the ultimate consumer in so far as may reasonably be done.
