debtedness, including past due interest, aggregating \$38,610,690.40, and reduces the annual charge to the farmer on an average of \$3.50 per acre. The present annual charge is about \$2.50 per acre when refinanced. Advantage for All.

While it may appear to some that the bondholder is being required to take too much of a loss, when it is remembered that his bond at present is in default and the districts are unable to pay interest or principal, the arrangements works out not only to the advantage of the farmer but of the bondholder as well.

Thompson, who made the local appraisal, is a practical irrigationist. For 27 years he has been connected with irrigation development, and at present is manager of the Langell Valley district in Klamath county. Thompson says that many of the legal obstacles heretofore existing because of conflict between the laws of the various states, have been coordinated and will facilitate the work in the future.

Emil Schram, chief of the irrigation division, is a practical farmer, whose home state is Illinois.

ASHLANDERS HELD ON SUSPICION OF LIVESTOCK THEFT

Gene Hastings, 32 Ashland barber, and William Chipman, 63 California street, Ashland, were arraigned in justice court on charges of larceny this afternoon, and their preliminary hearing was scheduled for two o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

The two men were arrested by state police for allegedly killing a goat Sunday at the ranch near Bybee bridge, operated by O. C. and L. G. Hamilton, brothers. State police said that Chipman did not deny that they killed the goat.

Officers said a man saw a car drive up to the ranch, two men get out, run the goat in a corner, and cut its throat. He approached the car, looked at the men, got the license number of the car, then notified the state police. The two men, upon seeing the stranger, threw the goat into some nearby brush and drove away, according to police who found the goat there.

Hastings was arrested this forenoon at Ashland, and bond for the two was set at \$150 each. Chipman was being held in jail while Hastings, who owns property here, was allowed to try and get bail for himself and Chipman.

Captain Lee M. Bown of the state police, said this morning that it was hoped the arrests would eliminate much of the petty larceny of livestock and fowl, from valley farms, which occurs almost every week-end. He pointed out that there are several charges under which such cases could be booked.

MORE CWA FUNDS MAY COME HERE

Definite indications that additional labor and funds may be coming to Medford through the Civil Works Administration channel were noted today in the letter received by Mayor E. M. Wilson from Burton E. Palmer, assistant to the administrator, stating that applications would be accepted from city planning boards.

This privilege is being extended Medford and four other Oregon cities, Portland, Corvallis, Eugene and Salem.

The applications will apply to such projects as traffic surveys, plans for zoning, studies and maps of highway or other public works, housing surveys and similar studies; needed, for which labor is not now available. The purpose is apparently to put more people to work in these lines.

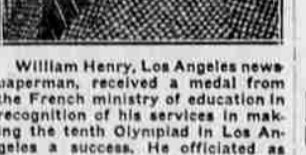
They made their home in Santa Ana, Calif., where Mr. Bichan was employed as dairy inspector for Orange county.
