

JACKSON CO. 20TH ON NATION'S LIST FRUIT PRODUCERS

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Jackson Co., Oregon, because of its pears, ranks 20th among the 3000 counties of the United States in the combined value of fruits and nuts produced in 1930, under figures just compiled by the census bureau.

Marion county, by reason of pears is 48th and Hood River, with first credit to apples, is 58rd. In a list of 48 leading counties, California has 28, Florida 8, New York and Washington 6 each, Oregon and Virginia 5 each. No other state has more than two.

The crop value of fruits and nuts for Jackson county was \$1,942,670; for Marion, \$1,841,918; for Hood River, \$1,728,047. The Washington counties represented are Yakima, ranking 7th; Chelan, 10th; Douglas, 25th; Okanogan, 34th; Pierce, 43th, and Benton, 45th. Yakima and Chelan both gain their high standing by the apple route.

The six leading counties all are in California, headed by Los Angeles, and all but five in the first 20 are found in that state. Oranges, grapes and lemons contribute most heavily to their supremacy.

LITTLE JOE FLIEGEL LOST IN THE SHUFFLE PEDALS WEARILY HOME

In a mass of Christmas shoppers yesterday little Joe Fliegel, three, lost sight of his mother, so he set on his tricycle and pedaled home. And he did such a very good job of pedaling that he arrived at 1012 Queen Anne in advance of police and his mother.

Discovering in a crowded store that little Joe was no longer at her heels, Mrs. Fliegel started the search for him. He wasn't to be found on Main street. The police were called to aid, but they, too, failed to locate the very little boy. Going home, just to see if by some chance he could be there, Mrs. Fliegel found her young son in tears at the front door.

"And why on earth did you go home, Joe?" she asked and the little boy responded: "You said if I ever got lost from you to go straight home"—and then more tears fell and they weren't all from little Joe's eyes.

SOLDIER SALUTES AND FALLS DEAD

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 21.—The sixth field company of the Canadian engineers was holding target practice yesterday. Private Allan Derbyshire, 30, who was acting as a marker, walked the length of the indoor range, halted before his commanding officer, saluted, and said: "Sir, a man has been hit," and collapsed.

He died in a hospital here today from the effects of a bullet in the head, without regaining consciousness.

Derbyshire apparently ran out to score a round before the "all clear" signal had been given. The bullet, fired from a .22 calibre rifle at 25-yard range, entered the right side of the soldier's head.

EAGLE LOST WHEN UNION IS BARRED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(AP)—The NRA today announced its first withdrawal of a blue eagle from an employer charged with violating the collective bargaining guarantee of the industrial law, in the case of the J. J. Martin company, furniture movers of West Roxbury, Mass.

This discipline was meted out for the public assertion by the company that "no union or union men would be tolerated in the business."

NRA ordered removal of six more blue eagles from employers charged with working their help unduly long hours or paying lower wages than allowed under the re-employment agreement.

GLEEMEN'S CONCERT FOLLOWS HOLIDAYS

Deferring to the requests of a great many of the holders of associate membership tickets, the concert to be given by the Medford Gleemen has been postponed until after the first of the year.

Originally the date had been set for December 27, but many of the ticket purchasers have plans that will take them out of the city and in fairness to them, the directors decided to rearrange the date so that everyone will have an opportunity to attend. The new date will be announced as soon as the organization completes arrangements for the auditorium.

SILVERMAN DENIED NEW MURDER TRIAL

PORTLAND, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Jake Silverman, Portland rooming house proprietor, convicted of manslaughter for the "gang-land" killing of Jimmy Walker and Mrs. Elvyn McLean on a lonely road near St. Hel-

ena, was denied a new trial by Circuit Judge Crawford late Tuesday. Silverman is under sentence of three years in prison and a fine of \$1,000. He was indicted on a charge of first degree murder and was tried at St. Helens.

BOISE POLICE CHIEF RESIGNS UNDER FIRE

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Andy Robinson, Boise chief of police for many years, resigned today "effective immediately" as the culmination of a local newspaper crusade against crime conditions here. The resignation was submitted to Mayor J. J. McCue, who said he had accepted it, as its wording "left me nothing else to do."
