

Know Your Beans Says Home Economics Dep't.

(By the Bureau of Home Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture.)

Five million pounds of dried beans, just bought by the Federal Surplus Relief corporation, are being distributed through state and local relief agencies to the families on their rolls.

This is another reminder of the vast importance of beans in the scheme of human existence, says the Bureau of Home Economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Nutrition specialists have a great deal to say about the food value of beans. The very name "navy" beans tells a story about the importance of beans as food. Not to "know beans" about something is shocking because everybody does know beans so well. Beans of some sort grow in every part of the inhabited world and apparently always have.

Bostonians, therefore, have no priority as bean eaters. All the world eats beans—and likes them. And to the best of reasons. The bean family is unique among the vegetables in food value. Beans can be used in many ways. Dried beans, uncooked, can be kept indefinitely, they can be stored in small space, or carried easily by armies, or on ships, or on long expeditions.

And, for stay-at-home or anybody else, beans are always cheap. They furnish a lot of food value for the money.

1/4 pound salt pork, dried
2 medium sized onions, chopped
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups water

Salt and pepper to taste
1/2 cup bread crumbs

Soak the beans overnight in water to cover. In the morning add 2 cups more water and cook until tender. Brown the salt pork and add to the beans. Then brown the onions in the salt pork fat and add to the beans. Mix the remaining fat with the flour, stir in the water, and mix with the beans. Add salt and pepper to taste and put the mixture in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle the bread crumbs over the top. Bake in a moderately hot oven (350 to 400 deg. F.) for 30 minutes. Serve from the baking dish.

THE RECIPES
Creamed Oysters, Serving 4
4 tablespoons butter.
4 tablespoons butter.
4 tablespoons flour.
1/2 cup cream.
1/2 cups milk.
1/2 teaspoon paprika.
1/2 teaspoon celery salt.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 cup small oysters.

Melt butter and add flour. Mix well, add cream and milk and cook slowly until thick, creamy sauce formed. Add rest of ingredients and cook one minute. Serve, poured over buttered toast, crackers or in patty shells.

Relish Gelatin Salad
1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture.
2 cups boiling water.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 tablespoon sugar.
1 tablespoon lemon juice.
1 cup chopped cabbage.
1 cup chopped celery.
1/2 cup chopped olives.
1/2 cup chopped pickles.
1/2 cup chopped pickles.

Pour water over gelatin mixture, stir until dissolved. Add salt, sugar and lemon juice. Cool and allow to thicken a little. Add rest of ingredients, pour into shallow mold. Chill until stiff. Cut in squares, serve on lettuce leaves. Top with mayonnaise.

Lemon Pie
1 baked pie shell.
1 cup sugar.
2 tablespoons flour.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
3 egg yolks.
1-3 cup lemon juice.
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind.
1/2 cups water.
3 egg whites, beaten.
1/2 cup confectioner's sugar.

Blend cup of sugar with flour and salt. Add yolks and mix well. Add lemon juice, rind and water. Cook in double boiler until filling becomes thick and creamy. Stir frequently. Beat whites, add confectioner's sugar and beat until creamy. Add one-third of this mixture to lemon filling. Mix lightly. Pour into pie shell, spread with remaining egg white mixture. Bake 10 minutes in slow oven.

WALDRON DREW DIES, RICHMOND

Word has been received in Medford of the death Monday of Waldron G. Drew, 38, former Medford resident, at Richmond, Calif., following an illness of nine weeks. Funeral services were conducted in that city yesterday.

Mr. Drew was born at Truckee, Calif., and was reared in San Jose. He became affiliated with the California Oregon Power company at San Francisco in 1916. He saw service in the United States navy during the war, and resumed his position with Copco in 1919.

In 1922 he came to Medford in an executive capacity with the company, and remained with them until 1929, when he went into the automobile agency business. He has been associated with the Standard Oil company in Richmond since 1929.

Mr. Drew always took an active part in community affairs, and was a member of the Rotary club here. He later became the first president of the Medford Lion's club, and was chairman of the Medford jubilee in 1927. He was a past president of the Copco forum, employees' organization. He was an ardent sportsman, being greatly interested in fishing and outdoor activities. Mr. Drew originated the Palmer Music house slogan, "We Sell Happiness."

In 1919 he was married to Miss Dixie Leahm of Campbell, Calif., to which union one daughter, Dixie Lee, was born.

sale of hard liquor by private concern.

Huge Operation Seen.

A. J. Tourtelotte, accountant, who was sent to British Columbia to make a survey of liquor stores for the Oregon commission, told the state board that "the board controlling the liquor business in British Columbia is one of the most efficient organizations I ever encountered."

There are 70 provincial liquor stores in operation in British Columbia, with a staff of 300 employees and executive officers, he said.

Sales each six months approximate \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000. A merchandise inventory of \$1,250,000 worth of liquor is now on hand. The inventory turnover is about 10 to 14 times a year.

Many Employees.

Tourtelotte said one large store in Vancouver, B. C., made 28,000 transactions in November. The larger stores have about 10 employees each to handle records, retail sales and warehousing activities.

Net profits from operation of the 70 stores in the province amount to from \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 a year. The population of British Columbia is considerably less than that of Oregon.

Hundreds of applicants for positions in the state liquor stores to be established in Oregon are watching the sessions of the control commission here with close attention.

An administrator to direct the operations of the state system probably will be appointed before January 1. It was indicated today. He will have a great deal to say about the personnel of the division.

Chairman McMoran said the present session of the commission quite likely will adjourn today until next week.

Liquor Vendors Warned.

The commission yesterday filed notice on persons now bringing liquor into Oregon for retail sale that the state control board will not buy up existing stocks of liquor when the time comes to open the state stores. As the state stores will have an absolute monopoly on liquor sales, this notice was regarded as equivalent to a declaration that business men stockpiling up on whiskey and other hard liquors may find themselves without a retail outlet when the state stores begin operation.
