Journalistic Sensation Created by Editorial in Staid Old Organ Asserting That Realignment Is Needed

(United Press Staff Correspondent)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—(AP)—Something approaching journalistic earthquake struck last night when politicians and commentators settled down to read their Saturday Evening Post and discovered an editorial denouncing the Republican party and talking about need for a political realignment and the formation of a new party.

No Future for O. P.

"We can see no future for the Republican party as it is at present constituted and as it has operated. The only element that is content to go along with the past policies of the party is the extreme conservative. Its old leaders have not sensed the temper of the times and of the country if they think that they can come back on the strength of the mistakes of the administration and the blunders of the brain trust. . . . The fact remains that under Republican rule abuses of power and trust flourished that the country cannot and should not forgive."

The editorial criticized the Roosevelt administration as tending toward the left, expressing disappointment that the President had not brought his party to stand for "clean-cut, sensible liberalism."

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RECOVERY SIGNS CLEARLY VISIBLE CLAIMS GIANNINI

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 27.—(AP)—

World-wide improvement in business was stressed today by A. P. Giannini, chairman of the board of Bank of America, in a year-end statement dealing with the economic situation.

"A forecast seems to me unnecessary," he said. "What we need today is a recognition of the improvement that has already taken place. Better times are here, and only the many false starts heretofore made and the confidence-shaken controversy concerning the president's recovery program have prevented recognition of this fact."
