Roosevelt, Stalin Share Estate Of San Pedro Radical

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Dec. 28.—(UP)—Joseph Stalin, dictator of Soviet Russia, and President Roosevelt were bequeathed \$1000 each in the will of L. G. McBurney, 65, who died here today.

McBurney lived alone in his own home and had been ill two weeks from a heart ailment. Police, who said he was known for his communistic leanings, found the will when searching his effects.

The will left \$1 to each of his four children.
