A. Limitation of profit can best be accomplished at present by placing the manufacture and sale of liquor under the regulation of agen-cles set up by government and un-der rigid restriction as to quantity, prices and dividends.

ernment should retain a large de-gree of control, extending not only to interestate shipments, but also
