

THOMAS ORDERS SALARY CUT FOR UTILITY CHIEFS

SALEM, Jan. 5.—(P)—Protest of the Pacific Power and Light company, the Portland Gas and Coke company and the Northwestern Electric company against the public utilities commissioner passing upon the respective budgets of the companies for 1934 was met by Commissioner Charles M. Thomas today by an order reducing salaries of all officials, rejection of payment of \$100,000 by the three firms to the Electric Bond and Share company, and refusal to permit donations amounting to about \$30,000 against the rate payers.

Thomas, in his order, declared the three affiliated firms were the only ones to protest and object to the commissioner passing upon the budgets as provided by an act of the 1933 legislature.

The order particularly eliminated any salary for Guy W. Talbot, retired president of the Portland Gas and Coke company. The budget contained a salary of \$7,800 for Talbot.

Salary reductions from \$18,950 to \$12,700, was headed by a cut of \$14,100 in the salary of Paul B. McKee, head of the companies. The budget showed a salary of \$29,100 for McKee, which Thomas ordered reduced to \$18,000 annually.

Other salary reductions included: John A. Laing from \$15,420 to \$10,000; Hilmar Pabst from \$12,150 to \$9,000; Lewis A. McArthur from \$11,340 to \$8,000; I. T. Merwin from \$10,800 to \$8,000; E. L. Hall from \$8,566 to \$7,000, and C. W. Platt from \$8,100 to \$7,000.

WESTERN PINE ORDERS FOR YEAR INCREASED

PORTLAND, Jan. 5. — (P) — The Western Pine association reported today that orders in 1933 throughout the western pine territory increased about 8 per cent over the previous year; that shipments were 2 per cent greater, and production 26 per cent more than in 1932.

For the week ending December 30, new business amounted to 23,873,000 feet, about 2 per cent more than for the previous week.

OFFICERS NAMED FOR PRODUCTION CREDIT COMPANY

A Production Credit Corporation for the counties of Jackson, Josephine and Curry was formed yesterday at the courthouse auditorium, with the election of temporary officers and creation of a temporary organization.

Directors named were Gordon Voorhies of Medford; H. Van Hovenberg of Gold Hill; Verne Brophy of Medford, and J. P. Wortman of Phoenix as the Jackson county representation.

Josephine directors were named as follows: George Wertz, Frank Schutzwald, and Ben H. Hilton, all of Grants Pass, and residing on rural routes. C. Zumwalt of Siles, and O. P. Ferguson of Gold Beach were named Curry county directors.

Robert G. Fowler, Jackson county agricultural agent was named temporary chairman.

Before the organization can start functioning, it must receive a charter, under which it will be incorporated, and the board of directors approved by the Credit Bank association.

The purpose of the Production Credit Corporation is to furnish permanent credit relation for all branches of agriculture, on a co-operative, self-help basis, under governmental supervision. Details of the plan were explained by W. E. Williams of Spokane, vice-president of the Production corporation.

Keen interest was manifested by agriculturists, 250 being in attendance from the three counties. County Agent Fowler said it was the "liveliest farm meet I have attended in a long time."

JOHN D. IMPROVED PLANS TRIP SOUTH
