SECOND HUNTER'S BODY RECOVERED

KLAMATH FALLS, Jan. 5.—(Sp)—A 20-day incessant search of Agency lake for the body of Ernest Nitschelm was ended Wednesday afternoon, exactly one week after the body of his hunting companion, Walter Wood, was taken from the water.

Nitschelm's body was caught by a drag line about 2:30 o'clock yesterday 150 feet east from where Wood's body was located.

Twenty minutes after a searching party composed of Don Pritchett, O. K. Puskett, Hugh M. Worrester and Bill Hickman had started dragging the lake with a specially constructed drag line the body was hooked under seven feet of water.

Nitschelm and Wood started on their ill-fated hunting party on the morning of December 12.
