

DAM DYNAMITING REPORTED CAUSE LOS A. DISASTER

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 5.—(AP)—An unverified report that a check dam a mile above Montrose, containing 100,000 gallons of water, was dynamited about midnight New Year's day, precipitating the disaster which lost at least 39 lives, was scrutinized by the sheriff's office today.

The report came as Coroner Frank Nance announced plans for an extensive investigation of the catastrophe, which caused damage of more than \$5,000,000. He said a jury of experts would be impaneled to decide whether any negligence was involved and propose a preventive measure.

Headline investigation of the dynamite rumor, Capt. Norris Stensland said two men were under surveillance.

The dam was owned by a private water company. It was understood investigators had come upon sections of pipe which appeared to have been ripped, as though by the force of a blast.

Meantime, an army of 6,500 men continued searching for bodies and removing the vast amount of debris washed down from the mountains upon Montrose, La Cressenta, La Canada and Venice. The fluctuating death list was cut down as duplications were weeded out and the missing list was trimmed sharply to 27 with the location of 45 refugees.

FRENCH SCANDAL MAY OVERTHROW CABINET IS HINT

PARIS, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Parliamentary circles predicted today Premier Camille Chautemps and his cabinet might be overthrown when parliament airs the \$40,000,000 scandal of the Bayonne pawnshop.

The government sent out a second series of messages to ships at sea and to French representatives in North and South America in an effort to arrest Serge "Handsome Alex" Stavisky, founder of the collapsed Municipal enterprise which received government financing.

Premier Chautemps called Albert Dalimier, minister of colonies, to his office at noon and demanded a clear statement of his connection with the Stavisky affair of which the minister asserts he is entirely innocent despite rumors.

In parliamentary circles, which until a few days ago had conceded the heavy government scandal, Stavisky's danger is real.

The police said Dalimier had sent out letters urging insurance companies to invest in pawnshop bonds without, however, specifying the Bayonne organization. Oppositionists to the government immediately commented on the sale of alleged bogus bonds for hundreds of millions of francs and pointed out that Stavisky, who had a police record and already faced other charges, had hounded with members of the government.

MEDFORD AIRPORT IMPROVEMENT OF \$17,000 APPROVED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—(AP)—Approval of four more airport projects in Oregon as CWA undertakings was given late yesterday by the state civil works administration, and Lieut. Basil B. Smith, state airport supervisor for the department of commerce.

Installation of runways and a drainage system on the Medford airport will cost \$17,000.

Improvement to the Klamath Falls field are estimated to cost about \$10,500.

At Albany, roofing of two runways and drainage installation will be done at a cost of about \$7,000.

Construction of a new flying field at Bend will mean an expenditure of about \$5,000.

The work will be done with CWA funds and will give employment to about 300 men. Improvements at several other points have been approved, and applications from a dozen other cities are on file. About \$100,000 will be spent on CWA work for airport development in Oregon.

Major George E. Sandry, airport engineer of the United States department of commerce, and assistant to Basil B. Smith, state airport supervisor, was here this afternoon from Portland conferring with City Superintendent Fred Schefel. The two had gone to the Medford airport to make a thorough investigation and the results of the conference were not determined.

The Medford city council, in meeting Tuesday night, approved an amendment to the original application for funds from the CWA for improvement of the Medford airport. The amendment provides for increased improvements and asks for \$104,000 instead of the \$17,000 originally asked for the installation of runways and a drainage system. No action on the new application had been reported to Mr. Schefel this morning.
