SHRUB DONATIONS FOR COURTHOUSE LAWN URGED NOW

Now is the time for planting shrubbery in the court house grounds, Mrs. A. E. Reames, former president of the Medford Garden club, reminded the public last night, outlining briefly the action which has been taken in that direction. The county has been particularly fortunate in obtaining the advice and services of the landscape department of Oregon State college under the direction of Professor Peck. Fred A. Cuthbert, a man universally recognized for his success in planting and landscaping public grounds, came here at the request of Mrs. Reames when she was president of the Garden club, and assisted in the selection of shrubbery for the court house grounds. In making the selection the following things were taken into consideration: climate, the natural surroundings of trees and shrubs and mapping out the grounds in detail.

The county court has expressed the desire to preserve the result of this work and to take advantage of the opportunity that has been offered Jackson county to so beautify the court house grounds, that they may be a fitting adornment to the building. The county court also feels justified in calling upon the citizens to contribute liberally to the purchase of this shrubbery.

The plans for the planting, Mrs. Reames stated yesterday, have been carefully prepared by the architect so that it is possible for civic groups or individuals to undertake to supply separate portions of these shrubs and trees and to aid in this work. The architect has submitted a complete list and names for each section of the planting. Estimates are available so that groups or individuals may ascertain the cost of the trees or shrubs which they wish to furnish.

The citizens generally will be interested in seeing this work done, but they should realize, Mrs. Reames pointed out, that it cannot be done without organization. The county court has therefore asked the Medford Garden club to continue its efforts and secure this shrubbery in time for late fall and early spring planting, which must begin soon.

Those interested in aiding should communicate with Mrs. T. W. Miles, president of the Medford Garden club.

ANNUAL DRAMATIC INSTITUTE SLATED JANUARY 8 TO 11TH

An annual dramatics institute will be held for recreation leaders for Jackson and Josephine counties at the Medford courthouse auditorium January 8-11, inclusive, at 7:30 to 10 p. m. Mabel C. Mack, home demonstration agent, announced today. This project is made possible through the co-operation of the National Recreational association, the U. S. department of agriculture and president of the Medford Garden club.

The purpose of this institute is to train leaders to promote and direct dramatics and recreational activities in the various rural organizations of the county. The enrollment of the school is limited to 60 leaders. Forty representing Jackson county and 20 from Josephine county. There should be two leaders representing each organization enrolled. It is desirable to have an equal number of men and women.

Boys and girls who are unemployed at the present time and who are out of school are also invited to attend the institute. Any organization interested in dramatics is asked to call the home demonstration agent for further details. There is no charge for this leadership training, however, all leaders who are enrolled are asked


