# 5 RECOMMENDED FOR COUNCILMAN FROM 1ST WARD

Fliegel, Stephenson, Osenbrugge, Erickson and Childers Have Support for Place Left by Clemenson

Five men have been recommended as candidates for the position of councilman from the first ward, to fill the vacancy occurring in the Medford city council by the untimely death of W. M. Clemenson. They are: J. P. Fliegel, local attorney; R. O. Stephenson, one of the owners of the Economy Lumber company; Elmer Childers, contractor; J. J. Osenbrugge, automobile dealer, and J. F. Erickson of the modern plumbing company. From this list one man will be chosen by the council at the next regular meeting one week from tomorrow night.

## Three On Petition

The five names were submitted at the meeting of residents of the first ward, called for Friday night at the city hall. W. H. Merritt presented a petition with 17 signatures, recommending Childers, Osenbrugge and Erickson.

Fliegel and Stephenson were nominated from the floor by delegations attending the meeting.

Councilman George Porter, acting mayor in the absence of Mayor E. M. Wilson, presided at the meeting. No more recommendations will be received, the meeting having been called for that specific purpose, and it was announced at the close of the session that it would not be necessary to present any petitions to the council recommending the same or other men for the position.

## All Good Men

The five men proposed are all good men, councilman stated this morning, adding that they were very appreciative of the cooperation given by residents of the first ward in presenting nominees for the appointment.

They are all well known through their particular lines of work and through participation in civic affairs. Attorney Fliegel, who severed connections with the Jackson County Building and Loan to enter offices with H. K. Hanna some time ago, is now exalted ruler of the Elks lodge.

## System Appreciated

Calling together residents of a ward to make recommendations for council members is a precedent started during Mayor Wilson's administration, and one which seems to be meeting with much favor throughout the city. In the past when vacancies occurred they were filled by direct appointment by the city council.
