

# Chandler Egan Named Member of Walker Cup Team for 1934

## MEDFORD GOLFER CLASSSED WITH 10 BEST IN COUNTRY

Sensational Showing in National Amateur Tourney Last September Believed Big Factor in Selection

tury ago, he has never before been selected to play for the Walker Cup. It is believed that his sensational showing in the national amateur last September when he put out Johnny Goodman open champion, was largely responsible for his selection. In May the team will go to England and there battle with leading British amateurs for the coveted cup.

Along with this announcement came the interesting news that the rules of the amateur championship have been changed, the qualifying rounds being eliminated and all former champions being qualified to play. This will automatically place Egan in the national tournament, every year and as his strong point is competitive golf, renders it possible if not probable, that he will break all golf records and win the national title again that he first won 30 years ago.

The A. P. dispatch is in part as follows: "Golf launched a reconstruction program all its own today with a thorough overhauling of the manner of playing the annual amateur championship, and the announcement of a thoroughly democratic 1934 Walker cup team, with four of the nine players new to the classic international competition. Pasterning the amateur championship after the British system, the United States Golf association announced the elimination of qualifying play in the tournament proper and the substitution of a full week of match play among a maximum of 180 entries, most drastic change in the history of the competition.

At the same time, Francis Gulmei, Boston veteran who led the Walker cup forces in 1932, was again named captain of the team that will meet the British at St. Andrews May 11 and 12. Hiteammates are Johnny Goodman of Omaha, present open champion; Johnny Finckler of Cincinnati and W. Lawson Little Jr. of San Francisco, all youngsters new to international play; H. Chandler Egan, Del Monte, Cal., veteran who won the amateur in 1904-05 and eliminated Goodman in the first round of the 1929 amateur but never before played in Walker cup matches; Max R. Marston, another former champion who returned to topflight from last season, and the veterans of the 1932 team, George T. Dunlap Jr. of New York, national amateur champion; Gus Mervand of Dallas and Jack Westland of Chicago.

Under the new amateur plan, 22 sectional qualifying tournaments throughout the country August 21 will produce the field that will start 18-hole match play at Brookline, Mass., September 19. All former champions "in good standing" are automatically included among the 180 certified for match play.

## OLD AGE PENSION FILINGS SPEEDED BY ADDED FORCE

To speed the filling out of Old Age pension application blanks, two C. W. A. women workers have been assigned to the secretary to the county court, and will start work tomorrow. The typists will fill out the complex blanks and ask the questions. The plan will be of benefit to all concerned. The old folks have experienced considerable difficulty in making out the blanks.

After the blanks are filled out a check will be made with county records and other sources, to determine length of residence, assessed valuation of property, if any, and the ability of unmarried daughters or other kind to shoulder the responsibility of caring for the applicants.

According to county officials, under a strict interpretation of the law, only a small percentage will be entitled to the pension, and then not for the maximum amount of \$30 per month. The county court, acting as a pension board, as yet has approved no old age pension. In a large percentage of the applications, only a small portion of the questions were answered. A complete answering of all queries provides a thumb-nail biography of the applicant.

## MURDERERS PAY PENALTY IN CHAIR

BELLEfonte, Pa., Jan. 8.—(AP)—Frank Stabinsky and Anthony P. Tetrosky were electrocuted today for the slaying of 18-year-old Mary Malinowski during a robbery in her home near Wilkes-Barre more than a year ago.

Stabinsky was 22, and Tetrosky one year his junior. Two holdup murders within three days were charged against the young men.

Within five days they are alleged to have engaged in, besides the two killings, the holdup of two Hazelton policemen who pursued them, a running pistol battle with Allentown officers, the wounding of a woman holdup victim, and a robbery in which they obtained \$9000 in jewelry after torturing a Philadelphia family.
