WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The right of a state to suspend provisions of contracts in an emergency—such as depressed economic conditions—was upheld today by the supreme court.

It sustained the Minnesota moratorium law, extending the time in which mortgaged property sold under foreclosure may be redeemed.
