Plans for the party were outlined at the meeting of the club in the city hall rooms. Members of the board of directors will act as the general committee, headed by Mrs. G. R. Backwell, club president.
The scholarship benefit is one activity the club has enabled to keep alive in spite of depression and all its accompanying difficulties. Since approximately 1910, Medford has contributed to the scholarship fund of the State Federation of Women's clubs, and several Medford girls have borrowed from the fund to complete their educations. All have repaid. The loans are granted chiefly to junior and senior girls.

M'NARY, MARTIN RATE HIGH SAYS MRS. E. C. KELLY

A fine word for General Martin of Oregon is expressed in a letter received this week from Mrs. Edward C. Kelly, who is now in Washington, D. C., with her husband. In the capital, she writes, he is accepted as one of the finest gentlemen and most able men the west or any other section has contributed. The outstanding ability of Charles N. McNary is also evident, wherever talk is heard, Mrs. Kelly also writes.

Referring to progress of the Medford application for sewage plant construction funds, Mrs. Kelly states that little is known on the outside regarding the progress of any of the project applications, and that the Public Works administrator takes particular precaution not to let anyone, particularly lobbyists, know who is handling them. The workers in the legal division, where Mr. Kelly is located, she states, do what they can to suggest changes to strengthen the possibilities of their own state's projects going through. But they get no publicity. All the Public Works employees, she writes, are working long into the night in an effort to speed the work, which is tremendous in volume.

Prices are high and dressing very formal, Mrs. Kelly announces, turning to a lighter vein and most members of the legal staff of the public works administration have come from the south. Western accents are few and far between.

A conference with Dr. Estella Ford Warner, formerly of Oregon, and an intimate friend of Mrs. Mildred Carlton of the Old State road, is also reported in Mrs. Kelly's letter.
