NATION'S INCOME TAKES BIG JUMP IN FISCAL YEAR

Wine and Beer Brief Period of Legality—Collections Are Costing Far Less

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—(AP)—The nation's income jumped upward some \$2,110,181 during the 1933 fiscal year—and what more, it cost the government less to collect it.

Guy T. Helvering, commissioner of internal revenue, also disclosed today in his annual report to Secretary Morgenthau that although 32 beer and wine were legal for only a small part of the 1933 fiscal year, the former brought in \$35,149,492 and the latter \$80,948.

With income taxes carrying the bulk of the load, Helvering estimated total revenue for the 1933 fiscal year at \$1,619,839,224 as compared with \$1,537,729,042 the year before.

Further, it cost the government \$1.25 to collect each \$100 of revenue during the year. That was 32 cents less per \$100 than it cost the previous year. All in all, it cost \$30,031,722 to collect the revenues of the government for the year as compared with \$33,870,903 the previous year.

Individual and corporation income taxes brought in a total of \$746,701,404. Helvering reported a decrease of \$309,565,293 or 29 per cent. However, there was a sharp increase in miscellaneous internal revenue, which includes tobacco manufacturers, liquors, admissions, communications and checks.

Miscellaneous receipts were \$873,047,820, a gain of \$372,073,475. Cigarettes Pay Much.

Tobacco taxes alone during the year, he pointed out, brought in \$402,739,059, of which cigarettes contributed more than three-quarters.

New York's 1922 per cent of the population paid \$376,546,972 or 23.23 per cent of the country's internal revenue taxes during the year.

Three states—North Dakota, New Mexico and Wyoming—paid only 0.03 per cent of the nation's internal revenue total.

They were the smallest contributors. South Dakota and Idaho ranked next, with 0.4 per cent and Arizona next with 0.93 per cent.

Near Prediction.
Final internal revenue reports showed little change from preliminary figures made public last July. The summary of collections for the year ended June 30, by states included:

Oregon: Income tax, \$1,556,108; miscellaneous taxes, \$1,111,177; per cent of total, 18.
