### "Wonder Ship" of British Navy On Rocks of Harbor

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., Jan. 12.—(AP)—The battleship Nelson, "wonder ship" of Great Britain's navy was still hard and fast this afternoon, hours after she went aground at the entrance to the harbor.

Numerous efforts were made to float the 35,500-ton flagship of Admiral Sir William Boyle, commander-in-chief of the home fleet, but they were fruitless.

The crew of 1000, mustered on the afterdeck in an effort to create confusion, jumped up and down in unison, taking orders from a leader, who waved his arms like a bandmaster.
