

# Roseburg Cagers Invade Tigers Den Tonight

## ANCIENT RIVALRY TO BE RENEWED BY FAST OUTFITS

Bowling Indiana and growing Tigers will be turned loose on the basketball court of Medford high school tonight. Medford Junior high Bulldogs will be pitted against the young Bucks of the Roseburg Junior high in a preliminary starting at 7 p. m. and the senior teams of the same schools meet in the main event at 8 p. m.

The Indians and Tigers split a two-game series last year, Roseburg winning the first contest on their own court and Medford winning on their own court.

The Tigers will again meet the Roseburg quintet February 17, at Roseburg.

Coach Hod Turner and his boys have been pointing toward this game for a long time and are of the opinion they can beat Medford.

The probable Medford starting lineup will be: Brown and Gillsky, guards; Harris and White, forwards; Hinman, center. Hoke Curtis, Harold Grove, Don Steuert, Bill Luman, Stan Kunzman and Olaf Severson may see action before the evening is over.

In years past the Roseburg Junior high school team was always one of Medford Junior high's strongest opponents, and the local boys are not looking for a "set-up" tonight, but know they will have to play ball from the very start.

Coach Warren of the Roseburg Junior high has developed a very strong team of youngsters that is capable of taking care of itself.

A large crowd is expected to be out to see the games. Practically the entire Junior high student body has identified its intention of being out to support the team and a large number of fans of the town are expected also.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Golf stars from all sections of the country, 64 qualifiers from a field of nearly two hundred starters, teed off today in the opening match play round of the annual \$4000 San Francisco national match play open championship.

The 18-hole matches brought together as representative a field as ever assembled for northern California's richest links event.

John Rogers, long driving pro from Denver, claimed the first share of prize money. He won medal honors yesterday with a score of 70, two under par, for the Lake Merced course. The pace-setting feat returned Rogers \$50.

In today's opening match play test Rogers paired off with Cliff Grover, youthful professional from Tacoma, Wash. Grover shot a 75 in the qualifying round.

## ALL-STAR TRAP TEAM SELECTED

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Jan. 13.—(AP)—Ned Lilly of Stanton, Mich., junior sensation of the 1933 grand American trapshooting tournament, was named captain of an annual "All-American trapshooting team" selected yearly by Jimmy Robinson, former statistician of the Amateur Trapshooting association, and announced today.

Lilly won the national clay target championship with 199 out of 200, the junior crown with 100 straight, and tied with Walter Beaver of Pennsylvania for the grand American title by breaking 98 out of 100 from the 24-yard line.

Others named on Robinson's team include: E. W. ("Ted") Renfro of Dell, Mont.; Belle McCord Roberts, Long Beach, Cal.; Frank Troch, Portland, Ore.; E. F. Woodward, Houston, Texas.
